

Hello Warwick Residents,

The Board of Assessors would like to notify everyone that during the months of February and March there will be a joint effort between the BOA and Roy Bishop and his business partner from Bishop & Associates to visit each property in town and taking exterior pictures of current standing structures on the property. These visits may or may not need to include an interior inspection; however, homeowners will be notified if an interior inspection is needed.

Also, did you know if you are 70 years old (or older), you might qualify for an exemption from your Real Estate taxes? Did you know that if you are a Veteran or Veteran spouse you might qualify for an exemption from your Real Estate taxes? We also have exemptions if you are blind or disabled, if you qualify. These exemptions are filed once a year within 30 days of the first tax bill of the year. Please feel free to contact me at the Town Hall for more information, and watch the newsletter, Warwick L, or Warwick L-Ternative (Facebook) for days that I will visit the Library and Meal Site during February and March.

# Four New Videos from Recycling Facility Advisory Board

The <u>Springfield Materials Recycling Facility</u> (SMRF) <u>Advisory Board</u> has released four short videos about household recycling to help viewers understand what happens to the materials they recycle. The videos are an antidote to misinterpretations recently shared by media outlets. The new videos are available at <u>springfieldmrf.org</u> and on YouTube (<u>www.youtube.com/@springfieldmrf4175</u>).

The videos focus on four different topics: Container Recycling, Paper and Cardboard Recycling, What Happens to Recycled Materials, and Recycling's Most Unwanted. Produced by Reelife Productions, the videos include interviews with recycling industry experts, footage of recyclables being sorted and baled, and information on the industries that purchase local recyclables for reuse.

These videos will be useful in classrooms, for community sustainability groups, family discussions, social media pages, and other applications. Director and Owner of Reelife Productions, Tom Adams, notes "It's a good feeling to know we are helping to increase the efficiency and efficacy of the recycling program in Massachusetts."

The SMRF annually processes and sells over 18,300 tons (95%) of the material collected by its 65 western Massachusetts member communities. Major news outlets have reported that "only a small percentage of plastic is recycled," but that statistic refers to the recycling rate of *all plastic manufactured*, including durable items not intended or designed for recycling. This figure does not refer solely to the items that residents put in their bins.

This new video series clarifies that the items western Massachusetts residents are <u>instructed to recycle</u> have value to processors and manufacturers who turn the materials into new products and packaging. In fiscal year 2022, through the sales of recyclables to commodity markets, the Springfield MRF paid its 65 member communities a combined revenue share of \$375,500.

This new series, along with the already popular <u>Me and My Bin</u> that was released earlier this <u>year</u>, gives western Mass residents a behind-the-scenes look at the environmental and economic values of recycling. The series sends a clear and simple message: **Recycling is important**, and we each have a role to play.

## Air Source Heat Pump User Tips (special thanks to Mass Save)

- **Use your heat pump year-round.** High-performance heat pumps are the most energy efficient heating systems, even on the coldest winter day. If you have both a heat pump and a furnace or boiler, your heat pump is the more energy efficient choice.
- Set it and forget it. Turning your heat pump on and off, or constantly adjusting its temperature settings, may actually use more energy and cause comfort issues. Heat pumps operate most efficiently when holding a steady temperature.
- Set the temperature for comfort. Common homeowner advice may tell you to keep the thermostat at a set degree for certain seasons (68° F in the winter); however, you should choose a temperature setting based on your comfort. Many models measure the temperature at the ceiling, which is warmer than at floor level. Heat pumps operate efficiently at higher space temperature set points in the winter.
- Avoid auto mode. When the temperature outside is mild, a heat pump's auto mode can sometimes result in the system switching back and forth between heating and cooling. To prevent this, set the heat pump to cooling mode during the spring and summer, and heating mode during the fall and winter.
- Seal in your savings. To make the most of your new system, consider a Mass Save Home Energy Assessment to help understand how your home is performing. High-performance air sealing, duct sealing, insulation, windows, doors and winserts can help keep the heat or cold that your new heat pump provides inside your home.
- **Prioritize your heat pump.** While high- efficiency heat pumps can provide 100% of a home's heating needs, some homeowners may opt to keep their pre-existing heating system in place as a backup or to heat a separate area of the home. In these situations, it's important to make sure the existing system and the heat pumps don't compete. This may mean setting the boiler or furnace thermostat to a lower temperature, closing a radiator or damper in the rooms served by the heat pump, or installing integrated controls.
- Switch over at preset temperatures. Integrated controls can automatically switch between a heat pump and backup heating system at a pre-set outdoor air temperature. Please note, the most cost-optimal switchover temperature will depend on the backup system's heating fuel.
- Clean your air filters. When your filters get dirty, your heat pump's efficiency will decrease. Check the filters regularly to get a sense for how often they get dirty. The location of your units and other factors can impact how often they need cleaning. Consult your owner's manual for instructions.
- **Keep your outdoor unit clean and clear.** To operate efficiently, outdoor units need space for airflow. Check your outdoor unit regularly. When it's needed, clear away fallen leaves, trim nearby shrubs, and shovel snow away.
- Have your heat pump serviced. As with any heating and cooling system, it's important to have your equipment regularly serviced to extend its lifespan and keep it running efficiently. To ensure peak performance, follow manufacturers' recommendations for professional service.
- Turn the units OFF-off to eliminate the "phantom" load. You can turn the units OFF-off by shutting off the circuit breaker for each unit when not in use for long periods, such as during the spring or fall. Check with your operators' manual or your installer for instructions.




# THEN, LET THE MUSIC BEGIN ...

We continue to celebrate the formal confirmation from the Massachusetts Department of Education that we are now our own district. We will begin educating kindergarten through sixth-grade students in the fall of 2023! We have an extensive long-range plan posted on our website. # TRINITARIAN CONGREGATIONAL CHURCH of WARWICK

Dear Friends,

This call for a worldwide fellowship that lifts neighborly concern beyond one's tribe, race, class, and nation is in reality a call for an all-embracing and unconditional love for all [humankind].... When I speak of love I am not speaking of some sentimental and weak response. I'm not speaking of that force which is just emotional bosh. I am speaking of that force which all of the great religions have seen as the supreme unifying principle of life. Love is somehow the key that unlocks the door which leads to ultimate reality. This Hindu-Muslim-Christian-Jewish-Buddhist belief about ultimate reality is beautifully summed up in the first epistle of Saint John: "Let us love one another, for love is of God. And everyone that loveth is born of God and knoweth God. He that loveth not knoweth not God, for God is love.... If we love one another, God dwelleth in us and [God's] love is perfected in us". Let us hope that this spirit will become the order of the day.

"Beyond Vietnam" Apr 4, 1967, Rev Dr Martin Luther King Jr.

Rev Richard Rohr identified the prophet as someone who places current issues in the context of "The Big Picture".

"What is a prophet? Let me try this as a definition: one who names the situation truthfully and in its largest context. When we can name the situation truthfully and in its largest context, it cannot get pulled into interest groups and political expediency. One of the gifts of the prophets is that they evoke a crisis where one did not appear to exist before...but those who had eyes...recognized, 'My God, the violence was already there'...That's how we recognize a prophet - there is a widening of seeing, this deepening of a truth that was always there."

The biblical prophets were people who were so deeply committed to the health and wellbeing of the religious and social communities they were part of that they could not ignore the glaring hypocrisies of the socio-religious hierarchies set in place by the ruling elites. They saw beyond the temporary advantages of the status quo, to those elites, to the long term health of the whole society. Righteous anger arose in them and drove them to speak out. From Moses confronting the "golden calf" to Martin Luther King Jr confronting racism, classism, militarism, (our own golden calves), the prophets were compelled to "evoke a crisis".

Theologian Megan McKenna says that the biblical prophets carried a painful burden:

"The prophets ached over injustice and were torn to shreds by it...[their intent was] the conversion of heart and the doing of restitution to rebalance and heal the world again. However prophets may prophesy, their integrity is shown by the way in which they give up their very lives as testimony and witness as they side with the forgotten and the lost ones and loudly proclaim that God... is aware of their pain and feels their suffering as [God's] own...One way to define a prophet is a person who sees so clearly what is happening in the present moment that he or she can tell us what is going to happen if we don't change immediately and radically."

True prophets are radicals, in the true sense of the Latin word, *radix*, which means "root". They dig down to the root causes and expose them for what they are. This is what makes them very unpopular with those who are comfortable or in power. They are attacked and accused of hating the very thing they love so much that they are compelled to speak out in truth, no matter how unpleasant or upsetting. The historian Howard Zinn wrote, "The most revolutionary act one can engage in is...to tell the truth."

Prophets, in the biblical sense, deconstruct current illusions, the status quo, and then reconstruct a new vision based on a foundation of love and equity. But not all revolutionaries are prophets. Some revolutionaries seek to simply replace existing leaders with themselves, keeping the same inequities in place or even imposing new, harsher regimes of exploitation and repression. They have only self-love.

Richard Rohr contends that, "...telling the truth is an act of love, an act of resistance, an act of courage...truth is revolutionary; it's part of the work of fierce love. Truth makes a personal, spiritual, ethical and moral demand upon us... telling the truth creates ripples of authenticity that change the world...it invites us to be honest about who we are, about our flawed-but-beautiful, broken-but-healing selves. Truth leads to reconciliation and peace; without truth, there is no peace."

Pass the Disk - a Discussion with Sam Stone about Building the More Beautiful World Our Hearts Know is Possible: Tuesday, February 7th at 7 pm @ the Library. What story are we telling? As Charles Eisenstein writes: "The world as we know it is built on a story. To be a change agent is, first, to disrupt the existing Story of the World, and second, to tell a new Story of the World so that those entering the space between stories have a place to go."

Join Sam, who grew up in Warwick and recently graduated from Wheaton College, for a gathering and heart-led discussion about the condition of our time, the constraints we face, and the stories we choose to stand in. By gathering together, we will hold space for a new story to rise between us: one of love, play, and vibrant possibility. We will read excerpts from Eisenstein's 2013 book, *The More Beautiful World Our Hearts Know is Possible*. Monthly Short Story Hour - from Africa: Thursday, February 16th - 7:30 pm @ Library: We'll "travel" to Africa as we read selections from *African Short Stories*, a 1985 collection co-edited by Chinua Achebe, whose first novel, *Things Fall Apart* (1958), has come to be seen as the archetypal modern African novel in English. Come to read or just to listen.

**Author's Talk - Russ Richardson, Forester: Tuesday, Feb. 21 - 7 pm @ Library (Rain date Feb. 23rd):** Russ Richardson grew up on a farm in rural Shelburne, and is the author of *10,000 days In the Woods: The Beginning*, the first of his two-volume account of a life spent in "the woods." His story paints a vivid image of a New England landscape that no longer exists. "The Beginning" covers his years as a youth through his time in forestry school out west, planting trees in Idaho, working for the Forest Service, and logging in Washington and Vermont before obtaining his first job as a professional forester and his return to New England in the 1970s.

Book Review - Manitou: The Sacred Landscape of New England's Native Civilization: Every library in New England should have this book. The history you've heard, that the five-state area was sparsely populated by humans, with few villages and plenty of forests, wasn't true. Rather, the Native Americans here were socially advanced, practiced environmental stewardship, farmed extensively, and were spiritually sensitive. They built thousands of cairns to commemorate important events, dozens of celestial calendars to track the seasonal changes, hundreds of stone snake and turtle effigies, dug scores of underground chambers and raised many hundreds of standing rocks and stacked rock structures.

The fascinating evidence of human habitation is as much as 14,000 years old and all around us. Written by James Mavor, Jr. and Byron Dox, and published in 1989, *Manitou* will help you see the leavings of the ancient tribes that lived here as we do—as visitors on the land. There are still rock structures to find and identify, all the treasures of the past have not been discovered, and some may be waiting for you on the flanks of Mount Grace. Happy hunting! Doc Pruyne

There is much to report for the new calendar year. Senior meals site is in operation. It is happening at the Warwick Community School on Tuesdays at noon. We are serving forty or more meals which are prepared by Chef Gail Beauregard who we employ a few hours a week. This is a testbed of our school lunch commissary design. There's no need to reserve, and you may contribute what you can to the effort. We have started a café at the school from 8 am to 11 am on Saturdays. You don't have to be old or from Warwick to join this offering which is fee-based. Besides providing a venue for food and fellowship, we are testing our facility kitchen in this case to generate revenue. Part of our school redesign includes entrepreneurship. Holly Manson, former NES and WCS cook has the reins on the café which offers breakfast and lunch items priced at \$3 each or \$12 for a plate / tray.

Town got the approval from the state for becoming an independent school district. It is a big task for which we've be ok'd. I am constantly impressed by our team of consultants, employees, elected officials, and volunteers. The next step is to elect a school committee which will happen first at a special election in April. This will give us legitimate school board of governance and they will serve up to the May 15 annual town election. If you are interested in joining a town government board please stand up or at least reach out to me to talk about it. In the school endeavor we are creating an advisory committee in addition to the SC and we are starting a nonprofit corporation so we can legitimately seek nongovernment grants. We need board members. We have been successful in the private grant regard having received a planning grant in a national competition, and to which we are seeking a second year of funding. There is interest in what we are doing to regain local control and educate more individually. Yes, we will have teachers! Our students will be moving along as they improve their abilities rather than in lockstep with their like aged peers.

The Selectboard approve an Eastern Collegiate Cycling Conference Bicycle Race April 15, a Saturday in Warwick, with a race course and time trials. We will publicize more details as the date approaches.


