

Coordinator Report for September 2023 Newsletter – David Young

I hope you've noticed that the exterior of the new fire station looks much improved. It's ready for plumbing and electrical inside. Thank you to all involved in the very long-term and much-needed project. The individual responsible for applying the siding and trim feels that he's getting too much of the credit and stresses that this was a whole community project that so many people have contributed to. So, on behalf of Warwick, thanks to all the many folks who have contributed and continue to do so.

In case you are wondering, three years ago Warwick Broadband moved into a room at the school when the regional school district vacated. We did that so we wouldn't have an unoccupied building to insure. Now we have moved to the old fire station's ground floor. Upstairs remains the Emergency Management Department. If you need to reach Broadband, the number is 413-676-9544.

After a two-week vacation, Senior Meals are resuming, but in its new iteration at Town Hall. Our restart begins Tuesday, September 5th, at noon in the dining hall. We have four volunteers who have agreed to train and test as food handlers who will be coordinators of this offering. There's a possibility of a paying position, so if cooking good food for a small-to-medium crowd is interesting to you, please contact me. Our current best-case scenario has our School Chef Gale B preparing a main course and sending it to the Town Hall, and we will be responsible for the rest of the meal.

We have scheduled a special election to expand the Warwick School Committee. We can move on this following the Attorney General's recent approval of our annual town meeting voted bylaw change that increased the School Committee from three members to five. The date of the election is October 23 from noon to 6 p.m. at Town Hall. By the time you're reading this, our new Warwick school district has opened its doors to our children. We've gone three years without a local elementary school, and this is the first time in more than 70 years that we are an independent school district; yet another project, like the Fire Station, of much perseverance and commitment by many people.

There is quite a lot of activity in the roads as the utility poles marked for replacement get addressed. We found out how this works when Warwick Broadband put twelve of our own tall masts in the right of way. We ended up having to pay NGrid for transformers if there wasn't one near, nearby poles and in some cases replacement wires that went past our pole. That's what's happening right now with the cable/fiber build. It's called make ready, making ready, or making space for the attachment of fiber. In many ways it's the biggest part of the job. When the last incumbent utility pole with XXs or arrows has been replaced, they will start the cable installation. Maybe they will start before, though Charter has a reputation for working serially. In our experience, this can go quickly. During August, Warwick Broadband had a contractor install Town-owned fiber from the school to the Town Hall and up to the Fire Station. It took a day to hang it and a day to terminate/polish the ends. This was done to interconnect these town buildings and share fiber internet from Springfield, and it will in the end lower Warwick Broadband's operating costs. At Warwick Broadband we spend about one-third of our revenue on connectivity; that is, connecting our network to the Internet. Warwick School District, like all town buildings is served "in-kind" (no charge) for Internet service.

TCC NEWS: As our community ages, TCC of Warwick is taking steps toward becoming a more Age & Dementia Friendly church. We've added hearing-assisted devices in the sanctuary and are assisting in elder transportation. If you're interested in joining us in this goal and would like to provide a ride, please come to the chapel and check out the sign-up boards. We're currently assisting two of our special elders, Ginny and Calvin Fellows.

Speakers from LifePath and Triad will be coming to share information on their programs during Sr. Meal at the Town Hall. Dates for these important presentations will be forthcoming.

Dear Friends,

Thirty years in a position of leadership is a long time; perhaps too long. Some leaders are gifted with the ability to transform themselves and their organization as times and situations change. Others become comfortable in "the way we've always done things" and allow and encourage stagnation. Life is change, and any person or organization that tries to avoid change is destined to die. Some-times that death is slow and "easy," sometimes swift and disruptive.

I have been the pastor of this church for thirty years, and it feels like it is time for a change. For the most part, it has been thirty good years for me, and I hope for the community. I have tried to be flexible and responsive to the changing needs of the community, but I am not at the upper end of the dynamic leadership spectrum and it's time for new visions for the church and the community.

As I move closer to my retirement on Oct 1, there are some relationship issues that will have to be worked out with both the church and the community. The Transition/Search and Call team are working with Rev. Terry Yasuko Ogawa, the SNEUCC Area Conference Minister, on setting up a process that will lead to as smooth a transition as possible. I say "as smooth as possible" because there will be glitches. Jaylin and I are not moving out of Warwick, and my not moving is going to present some unique hurdles for any incoming pastor. My physical presence will make it tempting for some to ask me questions about the progress of the transition, the new minister, and about doing special services in the community such as weddings and funerals, etc. This could present some obstacles for the new minister trying to make connections with the congregation and the community. Where appropriate, I will need to refer requests and questions to the new minister and the church leadership.

For me, the ministerial guidelines set forth by the UCC, of severing long and deep pastoral relationships, will be difficult and, in some ways, nearly impossible. But I understand the necessity for keeping boundaries that will allow the new Pastor to develop new relationships. This will be a process that the Transition Team and Rev. Ogawa will help me with. Rev. Ogawa will be meeting with me in the coming weeks to discuss what should and can be done in our unique setting.

There are some recent developments in the life of the church that I find very encouraging. The Free Food Friday program is stretching food budgets for people in the community and removing food from the waste stream. The Oliver and Virginia Fellows Community Garden is a space where volunteers are growing food for the community, where anyone can come weed, tend the plants and harvest food for themselves or the Free Food Shelter. The congregation is embracing and becoming even more age and dementia friendly. Some of these programs may not be on the top of a priority list for the congregation as it moves ahead. The members will need to make those decisions with the help of the new minister they choose, the Association, Conference staff, and the inspiration of the Spirit at work in Warwick.

My retirement is a chapter in the long history of this church; it is not the final chapter. There are new members joining the congregation. Two young families bring with them the prospect of young children growing up in the church, bringing new energy and new visions. The leadership that remains after I retire is vibrant and committed to the wellbeing of the church, the wider community and the world.

Jaylin and I will remain in the community, looking forward to the changes and participating where we can.


