Happy November!

We have had a successful opening to our school year. Here are some updates:

• We celebrated our first annual "Mountain Day" on October 4th for all students, staff and families. We hiked up Mt. Grace - learning about nature along the way - with our community guides, Clare Green and Brian Snell. At the top we had a picnic lunch, thanks to Chef Gail and Lunch Assistant, Anna Picard, and sang songs led by teacher Nettie Harrington Pangallo.

• We had our first artist-in-residence visit by painter Buck Sleeper on October 11th. Buck painted a piece inspired by nature, the seasons and our re-opening. Students will be creating their own works, inspired by Buck's piece this fall to share in an exhibit.

• Fire Prevention Week is observed each year in October. Each year, the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) sets a theme that works to educate everyone about simple but important actions they can take to stay safe. On Thursday, October 12th, Fire Chief Joe Larson, Lieutenant Shane Barberian, Firefighter Zack Marti, and Firefighter Tim Matthews educated us about simple but important actions we can take to keep ourselves and those around us safe when cooking. Students were also able to check out the fire engines!

• We had family conferences on October 18th - 20th. During our conferences each teacher worked together with each family to develop students' personalized learning plans (PLPs). These plans, co-created by the student, teacher and parents/guardians, include students' strengths, growth edges and goals for the year.



October 15, 2023

Pentecost runs through October and November, right up to the beginning of Advent, December 3rd, December 3 year. Advent is the time of preparation for the celebration of Christ's birth on Christmas day and welcoming our savior into our lives. Pentecost is the day we celebrate the Holy Spirit's descending onto the Disciples as a ring of fire over their heads, and as a new energy and conviction inside them to spread the story and teachings of Jesus. They begin to speak in different languages and began their ministry of going out into their world, strengthened and inspired by the Holy Spirit within them, motivated to preach about the life and teachings of Jesus. The event of the Pentecost would certainly have augmented their own feelings of their mission to spread the word. We must open our hearts, minds and spirits, receive this Pentecostal Fire and spirit and send it forth augmented by our own love.

Green Corner

Warwick was awarded yet another grant through the Green Communities program.

This grant program funds specific energy saving projects in municipal buildings that reduce energy use and are geared towards a transition away from the burning of fossil fuels.

This grant will pay for:

- Fire Station \$4,417 + \$16,210 rebate from National Grid for a hydronic heat pump
- Warwick Community School \$45,813 + \$25,775 rebate from National Grid for six more air source heat pump systems
- Warwick Community School \$13,862 for more winserts

As you can see, about half of the money will come from National Grid via rebates. Similar incentives are also available to homeowners through the Mass Save program.

These include heat pumps, appliances, insulation and air sealing, new windows, etc.

Coordinator Report for November 2023 Community Newsletter – David Young, Town Coordinator. 978-729-3224

One day in September Warwick Community School declared it "mountain day". They saw fit to invite me for a lovely climb on a trail I hadn't taken in years. Truth be told by the end I was taking up the rear of the column, but there was a need as I wasn't alone. We had a picnic and I carried a backpack with bagged lunches. I was a little taken back when Claire Green said she thought there were enough that I could have lunch. Don't assume a quid pro quo. One piece of feedback I'm getting is that there is not a better school lunch being served anywhere. That's not to say we're being profligate. We are continuing to model a tiny scale commissary approach with Chef Gale at the helm cooking in batches that get thawed and warmed in subsequent days. The design was to cook weekly and freeze and refrigerate; I believe the practice has become twice weekly. But we don't have to pay a highly skilled person each day for a tiny school breakfast and lunch offering.

By design we are meeting a lot of the needs of our tiny school district by interoperating with the town. At the onset this is operationally a bit confusing because normally everything from the hand soap to textbooks for the school would be in the school budget. We're figuring it out and I just have to remember that the town is providing occupancy related expenses. I know what small towns pay and I know what school districts pay and as a taxpayer prefer the town pay scale. For an example of why we think this works, we are putting in some video surveillance equipment and got a quote of almost \$2000 per wire run to each camera. This is the same wire we install in your house to provide power and data transfer for your Warwick Broadband. It isn't rocket science and we know how to do it so we do at quite low cost.

I'm impressed by the response to a part-time help wanted janitorial position at the school and we wish the highway department would get the same interest. On that front we've been advertising for truck drivers on FM radio. Have you heard it?

Senior lunch, as I hope you have come to realize by now, has moved to the Town Hall dining room. It is noon Tuesdays and supported by your donation at whatever level you can handle. Please join us.

A couple years ago Doc Pruyne wrote a grant to the Mass Cultural Council to fund a performance pavilion. They awarded us \$20,000 and we will be raising the structure, a pre-cut hemlock timber frame, in the next month. It is 24 by 30 feet, and the setting takes advantage of a natural bowl beside the school. Don Matthews has installed the foundation. Stay tuned or better yet reach out to me if you think you have something to offer this volunteer project. For safety's sake we will probably need to rent a crane and operator unless you have one out back. And the school would prefer we build on weekends.

Congratulations to the Building and Energy Committee who brought home another significant Green Communities Grant that is allowing us to shift from oil heat at the school and fire station to refrigerant electric power technology that is quite efficient. We were funded to finish conversion of the school and convert the hydronic garage floor at the fire station to an air-to-water heat pump. In both buildings we retain oil or propane so we can heat in extended power outages running off a generator.

Selectboard voted to open a special town meeting warrant for a STM this fall at a date to be determined. One need for the meeting is to get authorization for the town to enter into five-year contract on school busing. This is the year that the bus contract is going out to a multi town/district bid and the contracts are for five years. The Selectboard needs the town meeting authorization to enter into a contract for more than three years. We won't actually be approving the contract terms or compelling signing any contract. We are granting authority to sign a longer-term contract. <u>Please Note</u>: the Tax Collector's Office will be closed (with no appointment hours) Tuesday, November 7th-Wednesday, November 15th.

I recently found this gem for breakfast in Gardner. They also serve lunch which I haven't tried yet. Breakfast was great. My friend, Sharon, and I shared one of their cinnamon buns which are to die for: huge cinnamon buns drizzled with cream cheese frosting. Yummy. Almost filled us up before our breakfast plates arrived.

I had two eggs over easy, bacon, home fries and toast, and I could not finish the toast or home fries since I was stuffed with the cinnamon bun. Everything was cooked to perfection. Sharon had a vegetable omelet, homefries and toast. She, too, left some homef ries and toast. Trust me, you won't go hungry. Coffee is continuous.

The prices are a little higher than normal, but you get plenty of food. Cinnamon bun was \$6.95 but worth every penny. My plate was \$8.50 and Sharon's omelet plate was \$13.25.

I highly recommend this diner, I'm sure you won't regret it.


