WARWICK COMMUNITY SCHOOL & DISTRICT NEWS

Happy December!

We hope you had a joyful and restful Thanksgiving holiday with your families. We are having a wonderful fall with the community's children. Thank you all for your support!

Our mission is to provide all of our students with nature-centered place and project based learning. This month we continued our work with Professor Paul Bocko from Antioch University, who specializes in place and project based learning. He engaged in 1:1 coaching with each teacher and we also came together as a faculty for professional learning and curriculum design time with him. We are using Expeditionary Learning (EL) modules as a foundation for each project, as they are standards-aligned, rigorous and deeply engaging. Some updates from each classroom include:

- Kindergarten & first grade students are engaged in a tree study, where each student is studying a species of tree. Their essential question is: *What makes this species of tree special and important? They will be responsible for creating a book about the tree and for teaching their classmates what they have learned.*
-
- Second & third graders are studying schools from around the world and how they are similar and different. One of the essential questions they are considering is: *Why is it hard for some children to go to school in their communities? How do communities solve these problems so children can go to school? They are using the elements of a school they believe to be most important in the creation of their own outdoor classroom in the woods behind our school.*
-
- Fourth, fifth and sixth graders are investigating animal defenses. One of the essential questions they are considering is: *How does the environment around us allow for habitats to thrive and allow for the animals within those habitats to thrive? Students will create a book on an animal of their choice that details its habitat and ability to defend itself and survive.*
-

We are currently hiring an hourly lunch assistant. We are also building our list of substitute teachers. Finally, we need occasional help with administrative projects. If you or someone you know is interested in any of these roles, please contact Jess. We have had some wonderful community volunteers but we can still use more! 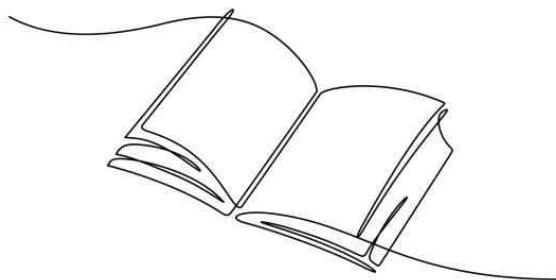
Local author's talk with George Bennett - Thursday, December 7th at 7 pm: Join Warwick's own George Bennett as he reads and tells stories from his new book *Into the Distance: The Lost World of Long-haul Trucking*, just published in the U.K. by Troubadour Press. It begins with a breakdown in Saudi Arabia, on his first trip to the Middle East, and goes on to describe brushes with smugglers, his inadvertent role in resolving a strike of French lorry drivers, and much, much more! 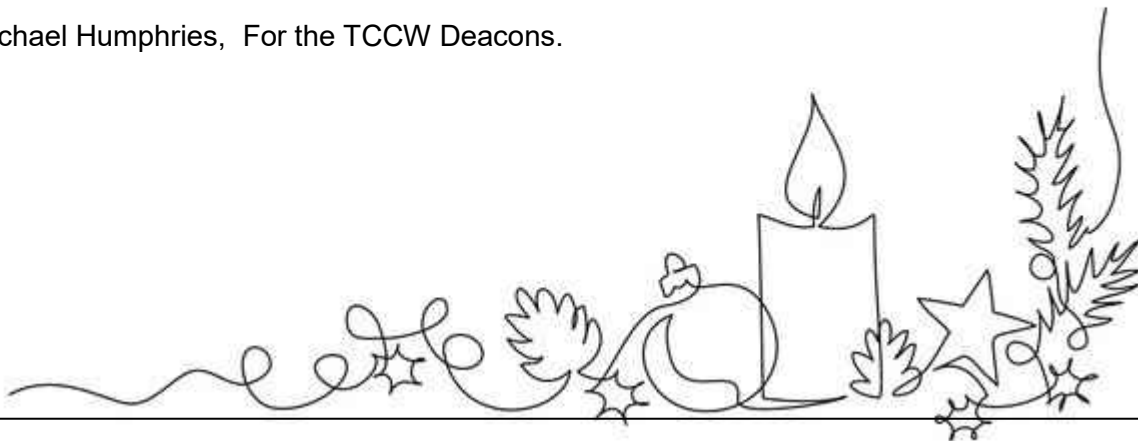

ON-GOING ACTIVITIES AT THE METCALF CHAPEL

FOOD PANTRY DONATIONS *Nonperishable food, personal hygiene items and household cleaning supplies are collected in the front hall of the Chapel. The personal & household cleaning items are especially needed as they cannot be purchased with “food stamps.”*

BLANKETS/SHEETS/PILLOW CASES/ ETC. *Bring clean, useful sheets (the shelters only have twin beds and mattresses) blankets and pillowcases, towels and washcloths to the Chapel, and we will get them to the shelters.*

MEDICAL SUPPLY LIBRARY *We have crutches, wheelchairs, walkers and many other medical supplies for free loan at the Chapel. Check us out before buying new. **Please bring only “durable equipment” (wheelchairs, walkers, “potty chairs” & similar items).***

FREE FOOD FRIDAYS 9 AM @ the Chapel Thanks to Clyde Perkins Sr., Zac Marti and many others, we have free food to give to those in the surrounding community who could use help stretching their food budget. Come check us out.

Green Corner:

Thinking of “going solar”? Looking for cleaner, cheaper electricity? Read on...

Buy or lease a solar array for your home or business:

Purchasing a system has a high up-front cost, but there is a return on the investment. To start with, electric bills probably go to zero if the solar system is sized right for your needs. In ten years, when the system is paid off, there are no loan payments or electric bills. The panels are guaranteed to last 25 years with a slight reduction in power output each year. You end up with no electric bills and no payments for at least fifteen years. After that, replacing the panels or inverter if needed is cheaper than a new system.

A leased system has low up-front costs, but the payments never end. You still pay an electric bill every month forever. The lease payments never end. If you sell your house, the new owner must either take over the lease arrangement, or you must buy the lease out and remove the panels. It's worth finding out what happens if there is a lease transfer in the first few years of the contract. Finding someone that is happy with a leased system after ten years might be helpful.

Power purchase agreements:

You may have received offers in the mail to enroll in a “local community solar” project. This is a power purchase agreement, not a lease agreement. It is another way for investors to build a solar array, get the tax credits, continue to sell the Solar Renewable Energy Credits (SRECs) generated by that project, give a credit to customers on their electric bill and then bill the customer for that credit at a discount, usually around 10-15%.

Electricity supplier options:

Lots of letters go out to customers from a variety of companies who want to be your electricity supplier. This is only about the supply portion of your bill. Read the fine print carefully. The price is often presented as an “introductory rate” and the price could vary for the rest of the contract term. These are binding contracts and there may be penalties to withdraw.

Aggregation:

Warwick residents who are “on the grid” will soon be receiving an official letter from Warwick concerning the new options for the supply portion of their electric bill, starting with the January 2024 billing cycle and going forward 24 months. We have joined with over a dozen other neighboring towns to get a better rate than what NGrid is offering on the supply portion of the bill. This is called “aggregation”. There will be three options available to Warwick residents at different costs, and all three are cheaper than the current NGrid price. (Note – NGrid prices change, and their price may be cheaper at some point in the next 24 months). These options include different portions of Renewable Energy Credits, or RECs. Folks who have already signed up for a different supplier (see above supplier options) will not be receiving this letter but can still opt into the program once their current contract expires. People can opt-in or out of the program at any time for no charge.

Town clerk John Paganetti assumed the additional role as webmaster at the beginning of the fiscal year, July 1 will be launching the new town website eminently. His first success was migrating all town email to a new host and that was painless. Public records law says we have to save the history and I had 16 years of email history to migrate. Departments and Committees will be provided a tool to share agendas and other document and meeting postings. There will be training.

Please if your town internet isn't working make a call or text sooner than later and don't assume the whole network is down. That is increasingly rare. Call or text 413.676.9544

The Home school coop will be placing and decorating a tree in the town park once again and if I get it together, we will work on repairing LED string lighting. This involves replacing a diode. If you want to contribute new string lights, please make sure they are not incandescent ones for energy reasons and the fact that we can't daisy chain more than three of those.

I've got six names to convene the formation of the Selectboard approved Town Fountain Committee and will call a meeting of the group to learn from A. George Day the operation and maintenance of the system.

Highway Department is in flux. We lost Super Larry Delaney to the position in Orange. We have three applicants so far and the position is open until filled. Thanks to our only FT employee Matthew Dorgan who is currently heading the department. We need employees too and residents of town are most prized in my view. A big thanks to Ed Matthews who has been working 40-hour weeks alongside Matt. And we need plow contractors. We are paying \$100 per hour for ton truck with driver and this is up from \$75 in prior years.

The performance pavilion frame is up at the school with thanks to Wayne Kirley, Andy Spofford, Mike Mankowsky, Doc Pruyne, and Dustin Shepardson, David Koester and John Bradford were walk-ons who helped us over the line.

I estimate we are about six months away from completion of the Charter fiber cable build and are engaging in digital equity work that I used to call computer literacy. Here in Warwick, you can get economy \$30 service that won't support TV streaming or pay \$50 for our best effort. And you can borrow a device Chrome laptop from the library.

The Selectboard have called a Special Town Meeting for Monday December 11 7 pm at the school. The need to get legislative approval (town meeting) to enter into a 5-yr bus contract was the cause. Please mark your calendars.

Every Tuesday at noon at the Town Hall is our senior congregate lunch in the dining hall. The food is great. Main course and much more is prepared by Chef Gail Beauregard. Clyde Perkins Jr., Howard Mathison, myself and Brian Snell work the kitchen and George Roaf is our pot washer. No reservation is required. Come join us.

I am thankful for the Highway and Transfer Station Commissions really stepping it up, and to all the individuals and businesses making our town a special place to live and even for many of us, to work. Merry Christmas.

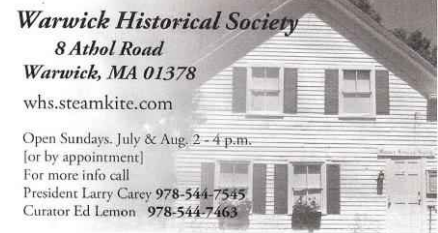

The Myra Iverson Doll House

Myra's first forays in Warwick were sometime during 1930 and 1931 with her father and a real-estate agent searching for a good buy. As they passed a building that was on Hasting Heights Road, the agent said that though the house was for sale, it was in such bad condition he didn't often show it. For some reason this intrigued Myra, maybe it was because of the 1795 construction date, or its 95 acres, or the enormity of the 13-room house, but she never explained. However, she was so intrigued that she returned later to view it again and against her father's advice, she bought it for around \$2,000.

Though it was unclear from her stories whether she and her husband Arthur were married at the time, she often said that he was so good at restoring the property that she had to marry him. It took around forty years before they were able to move to the property to live full time, but they used it as a summer home as their restoration continued during those years.

Myra's intrigue turned into a passionate love for the house, and she had Arthur build her a dollhouse that was an exact replica of their house with all of its rooms and nooks and crevices, including a secret hiding place in one wall that Myra would never disclose. They decided to furnish the dollhouse like they had furnished the main house. T. Arthur built the miniature furniture that was needed, while Myra shopped for miniature likenesses of the things found in each room. This dollhouse became one of Myra's prized possessions and along with a tour of her house, it became a must see item and was much admired and talked about in town.

When they moved to the house permanently sometime in the early 70s, more changes came to the main house. A modern multizoned heating system, solar panels on the roof for heating hot water and a windmill generator across the road to help with the electric bill were all added. The next decade saw many improvements of this type as Arthur was now retired and seemed to love to take on the challenges provided to him by this aged thirteen-room house built in 1795.

Arthur passed away in 1983, and Myra stayed on at the house for several years. Her age and the enormity of caring for the old house finally made her decide it was prudent to move back to Connecticut. She had most of the 95 acres put into conservation with the exception of the land on Hasting Heights Road that was sold along with the house. Myra had great anxiety about what she would do with her beloved dollhouse; and luckily she was able to find a new home where she could take it with her.

In the late 90s, as Myra's health was failing she was again worried about what would become of her beloved dollhouse. After considering some options which didn't work out, she called the Warwick Historical Society. Originally, we considered our limited space and we were not sure if we had the room for it, but after realizing the historical value a replica of a 1795 Warwick house and its recent history had, we decided to make it fit. It took several more phone conversations and few more trips to Connecticut before Myra was ready to part with it. The dollhouse finally arrived at the Warwick Historical Society and it is now among our most viewed exhibits. Though the dollhouse was built with a complete exterior, we have placed the exterior walls on the hallway of our building so the rooms with all their furniture could be easily viewed.
