Wowbrary e-newsletter: Contact the Library if you'd like to receive weekly notices of new items available for borrowing, with graphics and full description.



A couple months ago, after a trip to Bellows Falls to watch my great nephew in his debut of conducting and directing the high school play, my friend, Dawn, and I ended up stopping for supper at The Marina on the way home. We were surprised to have to show our vaccination cards, but luckily we both had ours on us. They still have the tables spread apart, but it was nice knowing that everyone in the restaurant - including staff - were all vaccinated. They are continuing with this policy.

Our meals were excellent. The special that night was baked haddock, and it was delicious served with potato and green beans. I think the price was under \$18, if I remember correctly. Most of their seafood is now "market price," as it is in most restaurants. Their sandwiches and burgers range from \$14 to \$18, and entrees are from \$15 to "market price."

Their service was excellent. Our server was a pro. He didn't write anything down. He came back and checked to make sure everything was fine shortly after serving and not after the meal. He's been doing this job for years! We sat inside as it was a little too early in the summer evenings for us, but the outside was open. Other times I've sat out on the deck, and the view overlooking \bigcirc 00

the river is beautiful.

Warwick School Renewal News – August 2022

Warwick Education Committee

The 2022 **Summer Youth Program** at the Warwick Community School (WCS) was a smashing success. The three -week program had full enrollment of children from Warwick and neighboring towns. There was tremendous community involvement in the youth activities throughout. The Education Committee along with the Warwick community look forward to this commitment continuing through more youth enrichment programs and the re-opening of the school in 2023 in a new, independent school district.

Janice Starmer and Brian Snell coordinated the program, which received funding from **MA Cultural Council**, (via the Warwick Cultural Council), Warwick Arts Council, and the town.

Many thanks to the numerous Warwick volunteers who helped make the program a success. A big shout out goes to super-helpful junior counselor Ren Waggenbeek. Some of the summer youth activities included: hiking and exploration in the forest around the school, making clay toad homes and gnome homes, visiting Clare Green's pond habitat and fairy cottage, learning about camp fires with Kai Pratt, gaining more understanding of solar power and cleaner energy options from Janice and Steve Kurkoski, forest stewardship and plant identification with Tom Ziniti, yoga and chakra balancing with Sara Mitchell, dissection of owl pellets, knots with Michael Humphries, native America stories, smudge stick making and drumming with Tracey Dawn, learning about Warwick's past with a visit to the Warwick Historical Society thanks to Clyde Perkins Jr and Clare Green followed by meeting Zylpha Smith, a character from Warwick's bygone era.

Planning for the **Pavilion/Amphitheater and Outdoor Classroom** at WCS continues. The town is working with an experienced timber framer who helped design drawings which were then submitted to a structural engineer. Once those are approved, foundation work can be scheduled. The plan is for concrete work to happen before the ground freezes in the fall. The timber-frame structure would use native lumber, sourced and milled locally. This project wouldn't be possible without our many supporters. Thank you! Donations are still welcome. Members of the Education Committee, Advisory Committee on Elementary Education, Governance Committee (Pro Tempore) and the Selectboard are busy working on key elements of Warwick becoming an independent school district by 2023. These include: 1) transition, tuition and retirement funding agreements with the Pioneer Valley Regional School District and 2) submission of the long-range education plan to the MA Department of Elementary and Secondary Education (DESE). ANNUAL HOUSEHOLD HAZARDOUS WASTE COLLECTION DAY

Franklin County Solid Waste District is planning to hold the 2022 household hazardous waste collection on Saturday, September 24th at GCC's Main Campus and the Orange Transfer Station.

Residents and businesses must pre-register by September 16th. Online preregistration for the 2022 collection will begin in mid-August, at: franklincountywastedistrict.org. Mail-in registration forms will be available in late August at town transfer stations and in local newspapers.


Participants will be assigned an appointment time to bring wastes to the collection; an appointment time and instructions will be provided by mail after registration is processed.

The collection is free for residents of most of the District's 21 member towns. Businesses may participate but must pay for disposal costs. For business registration information, call (413) 772-2438.

This collection provides an opportunity to dispose of hazardous items that should not be put in the trash, such as leftover oil-based paints, stains, thinners, pesticides, herbicides, pool chemicals, motor oil, antifreeze, household cleaners, and other household chemicals. A more complete list of acceptable items is at: franklincountywastedistrict.org.

Batteries and mercury-containing items such as fluorescent light bulbs, thermometers, and thermostats will not be accepted at this collection. These items, which may contain mercury or heavy metals, should never be put in trash or recycling. Handle carefully, bring them to a municipal transfer station or a Regional Hazardous Waste "Super Site" and hand to attendant. In addition, fluorescent light bulbs are accepted at Lowe's Stores (all types of fluorescents), and Home Depot (CFLs only).

Dear Friends,

"Hear this, you that trample on the needy, and bring ruin to the poor of the land, saying, 'When will the new moon be over so that we may sell grain; and the Sabbath, so that we may offer wheat for sale. We will make the ephah (a measure of grain) small and the shekel (the price of the grain) great, and deal deceitfully with false balances, that we may buy the poor for silver and the needy for a pair of sandals, and sell the refuse of wheat." Amos 8: 4-6

The prophets of the Bible are not the kind of people you would want to invite to your party celebrating the record profits your oil company is making during this latest round of inflation. They might have the audacity to mention that millions of people are suffering from what you are celebrating. "What's the big deal? There was nothing illegal; we just took advantage of a situation. That's the 'Market Place;' the efficiency of unfettered capitalism rewarding the shrewd investor." Jesus wasn't invited to such celebrations in his day, either.

I can't help but wonder what Jesus would say to the Supreme Court Justices about their recent, far-reaching rulings. Would he say, "well done good and faithful servants" or "Woe to you, scribes and Pharisees, hypocrites! For you tithe mint, dill, and cumin and have neglected the weightier matters of the law: justice and mercy and faith. It is these you ought to have practiced without neglecting the others."


Justice and mercy and faith. I was recently asked what I meant by "justice" and I had to think for a minute, because there is so much to that question. We have several signs up at the church that use the word "justice," but what exactly do we mean; what does justice look like? Does justice mean according to the law? I eventually responded that, for me, "justice" is defined by the life of Jesus as portrayed in the Gospel stories; "...and there was given to him the book of the prophet Isaiah. He found the place where it was written, 'The Spirit of the Lord is upon me, because he has anointed me to preach good news to the poor. He has sent me to proclaim release to the captives and recovery of sight to the blind, to set at liberty those who are oppressed, to proclaim the acceptable year of the Lord.'... And he began to say to them, 'Today this scripture has been fulfilled in your hearing."

I have to admit that I am very wary of people who quote scripture to me because often they are taking a short phrase out of the context of the larger story, but, for me this sets the context of the rest of the stories in the Gospels; this is the "plumb line" (Amos 7) against which my definition of justice is measured. Do I always measure up? By no means, but that is the function of the plumb line; it gives me a reading of where and how far I am wandering from what I claim to be my standard of justice and mercy and faith.

I believe that Jesus' life is the plumb line and the personification of justice and mercy and faith. He, in his mercy, defended the adulterous woman who was about to be stoned, legally stoned to death by the self righteous crowd. In his story of the "Good Samaritan" the priest and the Levite, who passed by the beaten man, were high ranking religious leaders who had an "obligation" to maintain their religious purity. They may have had thoughts and prayers for the man, but they couldn't be sullied by touching him. On the other hand, the Samaritan, an impure foreigner, stopped to help and even went well beyond the least he could do to bring healing and relief; mercy.

Jesus' faith was an instrument meant for healing and restoration, not a hammer of punishment and exclusion. Mercy meant going above and beyond any legal definition of moral action. Justice was a result of living with compassion and love.

The scholarship committee is looking for new members. It involves meeting once a year to do the awarding. Contact any member if you are interested.


