Suggestions for your consideration:

People who have been vaccinated and boosted have much lower risk of severe illness and death than unvaccinated people. That being said, there are some simple precautions that we all should follow. Being vaccinated does not keep you from getting Covid, but it does protect from serious Covid illness. Being vaccinated and boosted keeps you off a ventilator. Stay up-to-date with your vaccinations and boosters

- Maintain improved ventilation throughout indoor spaces when possible.
- The Covid rate in Franklin County is on the rise again.
- Wear a mask when you are among people whose vaccination status is unknown.
- If you are at high risk because you are immunocompromised, you should wear a mask indoors or talk to your health care provider about mask wearing.
- If you are up-to-date on your vaccinations you may decide to be outdoors without a mask
- Remember social distancing, frequent hand washing, and masks are great mitigation strategies.
- If you test positive for Covid you must isolate for five days and then get tested again. if the test is negative, you may come out of isolation but should wear the mask whenever you are out of your home for the next five days.

Note that individual groups you belong to may choose to require masks. If so, please respect their policies.

Restaurant Review - Gloria Varno

I have gone to this restaurant twice since the senior movies have started up, and both times the food was excellent. The most recent trip to Bridgeside was one of the nice, warmer days in the high sixties, and the place was packed. All the seats were taken on the patio, so we had to sit inside.

This time I had the "Foundation Burger" for \$10.95, a local Millstone 6 oz burger served with lettuce and tomato. I added extras such as cheddar/Swiss/American +\$1; caramelized onions or sautéed mushrooms +\$.75; avocado +\$2; bacon +\$1. The burger is *huge*. One friend had the same thing only with cheddar and raw onions, and the third friend had the autumn salad for \$12.95. This salad has mixed greens, sliced apples, glazed pecans, gorgonzola, crumbles, dried cranberries, and a side of homemade poppy seed dressing. Add chicken or shrimp +\$5; add scallops +\$8. She added crispy chicken which was a huge piece of chicken breast.

The service was excellent, cheerful, and prompt. I hope to sit on the patio next time, as it is covered and shady. Their prices are about average, considering how all prices are going up. Burgers and sandwiches run \$11.95 to \$15.95 with some additions as indicated on the Foundation Burger. Their entrees run \$14.95 to \$25.95 for steaks and some seafood. I would recommend the Bridgeside Grille for either a nice lunch or dinner.

This independent group is **not** a Town of Warwick organization. The Warwick Arts Council is a merry bunch of town folks that have sponsored art and cultural programs and events in town for over 30 years! Programs it has put on include Annual Art Show & Sale, Blues Nights, Concerts (from Jazz to Classical to Jug Band), Old Home Days theater & music performances, Beatnik coffeehouses, narrative poetry evenings, Soup and Song gatherings, writing programs, film screenings, slideshows, many school arts programs and scholarship support. The Arts Council has periodically partnered on events with the Warwick Cultural Council, (an official town committee) which receives state funds from the MA Cultural Council.

With the pandemic, the group's event energy has been greatly reduced, but we are looking for new ideas and energy to get more programs happening. The Warwick Arts Council has Federal 501C3 non-profit status and has done its own fundraising over the years through benefit auctions, proceeds from the tent rentals and event donations. Alan Morgan is the money guy (bookkeeper) and Janice Starmer is the president. Other members include Mari Rovang, Suzanne & Sandy Renna, Laurie Crane, Cheri Robartes and Nancy Harnden. <u></u> Municipal Electric Aggregation report for 2021 - a summary An electric municipal aggregation program took effect in late 2020 and will continue to be available until January 2024. It is called aggregation because not only did Warwick get a deal by aggregating all electric customers in town, but we joined forces with 12 other neighboring towns to get the best price on the electricb ity supply portion of our electric bills. There are a total of 430 residential electric meters in Warwick, including both R-1 customers (who pay the full rate) and R-2 customers (who pay the low income rate - a 32% discount on the full bill). There are 361 R-1 customers, but only 224 are enrolled in municipal aggregation - 62%. There are 69 R-2 customers, but only 32 are enrolled - 46%. Some customers are not eligible to participate in the municipal aggregation program because they have a contract with another supplier. Often when these contracts expire the customer does not know it and the price goes up. They stay with the supplier on a monthly basis until the customer makes a request to change suppliers. (G) When a contract expires the customer can switch to the municipal aggregation program to get a better rate. Look on page 2 of your National Grid bill for the name of your supplier. If it is Dynegy Warwick Aggregation. then you are already enrolled. If another name appears there - even if it is National Grid - call the number listed there and see if you can switch without a penalty. It is very easy to sign up. Check out this web site - https://colonialpowergroup.com/warwick/ or call Dynegy at 866-220-5696 for more info. There are two options: option 1 price is fixed at \$0.09433/kWh, and that is much lower than National Grid's 🚳 Basic Service price, which currently averages \$0.1316 for last winter & this coming summer. Even better is b the fact that all the electricity consumed under this option will be offset by wind power somewhere in the US. In 2021 alone, account holders in Warwick's aggregation plan saved over \$40,000 when compared to those residents still on NGrid's basic service rate. People with solar electric panels (PV) installed before 2017 don't lose their net-meter credits, and can even sign up for option 2 at \$0.1314/kWh, so that any electricity exported will be credited at that higher rate. Did you know there are about 55 households in Warwick with solar electric panels? ...not including the homes that are off the grid. Their solar panels are making clean electricity during the daytime and sending it down the wires to their neighbors - how cool is that? Questions? Call a friendly Buildings & Energy Committee member - we are here to help us all get to a better (and cleaner) future. (b)

God is Change— / Seed to tree, / tree to forest; / Rain to river, / river to sea; / Grubs to bees, / bees to swarm. / From one, many; / from many, one; / Forever uniting, growing, dissolving— / forever Changing. / The universe / is God's self-portrait.

- Octavia E. Butler, Parable of the Sower (1993)

Friends,

To the Franciscan order of monks, Jesus was the second incarnation of God. The first was creation itself; God, revealing God's self in the intricate, interrelated, awesomely beautiful, diverse universe. This is God's self-portrait and, like any self-portrait, it gives us a glimpse of the artist but is never the totality of the artist. So all the beauty, the interconnected diversity that we see in the universe is part of but not all of God. For a God this awesome to regard us, who are as ephemeral as a nano-quark, as worthy of attention is incomprehensible.

God's next level of incarnation, Jesus, God's self in human form, was not to show us how we have to behave in order to be worthy of God's notice, but that we already are part of God's awareness; a particle of God. If God is, as Octavia Butler expresses, "change", then we are going to be constantly experiencing change in our lives. How are we to deal with that?

The phrase, "Do not fear", or its equivalent, is the most commonly repeated phrase in the bible. Sometimes it comes from a human trying to take control of others, and things tend to go downhill fast. At other times, it is spoken as simple, bedrock truth by those who see beyond themselves toward God. Jesus spent a lot of his time teaching his disciples that he and God were one and that they and God were one. Being "one with" does not mean equal to or in control of, it simply means being in right relationship with God, the universe, each other and our selves.

"It simply means", what a dumb thing for me to say. It is not simple, it takes a lifetime and it is hard work. Putting our trust in God, in a power higher than our self, our "tribe" or our "tradition" is frightening, especially to those who have a vested privilege or position. For such vested persons, change IS frightening beyond acceptable. Keeping the status quo is paramount; even with violence if necessary.

"Do not fear" requires accepting change, not just as inevitable, but even stimulating or enlivening; what does this change hold within it that is good; that is of God? The "Do not fear" isn't meant to say there is nothing that could go wrong, it means that God will never be absent from you even when it feels that way. We are always a part of God, never apart from God, even in the event of death. The inseparable oneness of the universe, the image of God, gave Jesus the courage to face death with conviction. It is what gave the Buddha the courage to give up power and privilege to gain right relationship with all life. It gave Gandhi, Martin Luther King Jr, Bishop Oscar Romero and others the ability to face death with hope. It gave Nelson Mandela and Desmond Tutu the courage to hope for change in the face of official, government-sanctioned violence. It can give us hope that fear, hatred, division and violence ultimately will not prevail, and whatever we can do for peace and justice is not irrelevant.

"When you come to the edge of all the light you have, and must take a step into the darkness of the unknown, believe that one of two things will happen. Either there will be something solid for you to stand on - or you will be taught how to fly."

Warwick School Renewal News - June 2022

Warwick Education Committee

- The 3-week summer program at WCS, starting on June 27th, is quickly filling up. There are a few spaces left. If you would like to register a child, please contact Janice Starmer at hothill@valinet.com or by calling 978-544-8968. The program, a collaboration with Antioch University will run four days a week, with both morning and afternoon sessions, with a focus on nature, culture, and the arts. Coordination of the program will be handled by Selectboard member Brian Snell and Janice Starmer. Funding comes from **MA Cultural Council** (via the Warwick Cultural Council), Warwick Arts Council, and the town.
- Warwick was selected for a one-year, supportive planning grant for \$215,000 in a national competition for change-making new schools! We cannot yet create a detailed press release, but we want our residents to know how inspiring it is that our very small community was selected from school proposals across the nation. The private foundation that sponsors this grant program states they want to support new public schools opening in 2023 that are change-makers in public education--that have high achievement as a goal and address diversity. From our earliest school plan in 2019, we had incorporated a "global classroom" initiative, connecting our rural children to other children around the country and world. In so doing we will strive to address diversity in a rural community without much diversity.

Town Coordinator David Young will serve as point person for the town for the grant. More information will follow in June, when we know the guidelines for detailed press releases. We are very proud and appreciative of everyone working to re-open our school - it's a terrific plan for our students.

- Warwick and Pioneer Valley Regional School District teams are in the final stages of working out the transition agreement, the tuition agreement, and related details of the withdrawal.
 Warwick hopes to complete these essential elements of withdrawal in June. At the May 9
 Warwick Selectboard meeting, \$5,000 from ARPA funds was authorized for withdrawal-related legal expenses.
- Planning for the <u>Pavilion/Amphitheater and Outdoor Classroom</u> at WCS continues. Design drawings for the structure have been developed and submitted to a structural engineer. The timber-frame structure would use native lumber, sourced and milled locally. The town will be purchasing materials and construction services this building season as part of fulfilling our grant obligations. We will need **volunteers to erect and construct the pavilion**, along with town personnel. This project wouldn't be possible without our many supporters. Thank you! Donations are still welcome. More - Voices from the Past

Arline Lincoln and I have found another interesting entry from old minutes of meetings of the First Parish and Religious Society of the Unitarian Church. We found this entry as part of article 5 voted at a special meeting of December 25, 1871 (note date). It reads: "Also voted that Ladies may be admitted into the Parish the same as male members and to have the same privaleges- (sic) The following persons made application to be admitted into the Parish as legal members at our next Parish meeting-

Mr. Naham Jones. Mrs. E. C. Sibley Mrs. Lucy B. Jones Miss Fanny P. Russell" It was a good move to admit Mrs. E. C. Sibley. Experience Sibley was a daughter of Lemuel & Rhoda Wheelock and when she died in 1884 she bequeathed half of her estate to the Warwick Library and the other half to the First Parish and Religious Society. The library was allowed to use part of the funds to renovate the Baptist church which became the present day library and the rest of the library share is held in the Sibley trust fund of the library to this day.




