The Green Corner


At the beginning of December, many Warwick residents received a postcard explaining the Town's new Community Choice Power Supply Program options.

Those who are in the program now don't have to do anything – they will be automatically enrolled in the new program at the new standard (default) rate. This year there are two other options – one more expensive and another slightly cheaper option (see chart below).

Even the least expensive option is quite a bit more than the deal we got over three years ago. Those prices are probably gone for good. Starting with the bill for January usage, folks will be paying more than what they were accustomed to. If it is any consolation, all three prices are still lower than what National Grid is now charging for the supply portion of the bill.

If you are wondering if you are in the program now, look at page two of a recent bill under "Supply Services." If it says "Dynegy (Warwick Aggregation)" and the price per kWh is .09433, then you *are* in the program at the default rate. If your bill has another supplier, then call the number listed there and see if you can switch.

Coordinator Notes - January 2024 - David Young

The past few months have seen both the Transfer Station and Highway Commission much more active. Highway commissioners have even met on Friday evenings to interview applicants. In the end, they recommended Matt Dorgan who was already employed by us as superintendent. Welcome, Matt. The phone number and email for the department remain the same: 544-6349 and <u>highway@town.warwick.ma.us</u>. The Commission has a lead on another employee, so if you have been considering applying to drive and labor, please do so.

Our property tax bills will be coming out soon, and you will note that the property valuations have jumped. This was due to appreciation over the last few years in the market. The adjustment was a factor applied across the board. Your assessment relative to total assessments is the way we allocate the tax burden among payers. Changes in valuation will change the tax rate, and they will not affect the tax levy which is the tax revenue we are allowed to bill. That amount is the result of annual town meeting votes and limited by the tax cap law known as Proposition 2½. The key piece to understanding is the levy limit. It is the maximum we can tax per year, and it grows by 2½ % per year unless authorized by an override vote.

Often at full revaluation there will be some movement between different properties in response to market appetite or lack of for certain types of housing. Say, new versus old. But this time the valuation change is due to an applied factor. The assessors did go out and look at properties. This resulted in finding some new valuation for additions and other unpermitted work. This results in more money for the town and is called new growth. Except for finding hidden new growth, a re-valuation does not result in more funding for the town because we are calculating backwards from the amount we need and are allowed to tax, and property valuations establish the allocation.

Electric supply costs for us are going up. We are part of a multi-town group aggregating our supply of electricity, and our very favorable three-year contract is expiring. We went out to bid, and the new contract is more costly and the best we could do. It is a two-year contract. It is, however, less costly than the National Grid standard offering and especially after they increase rates for the winter. To get the lowest price you are going to need to contact Colonial. I have no doubt that there is more in this newsletter on the subject, and know that Building and Energy Committee Chair Janice K has been at Senior Lunch the last few Tuesdays to discuss this change with folks.

Thanks to Representative Suzanne Whipps for getting the town a \$50,000 earmark grant for our Fire Station construction. This is known as a member item or derisively as pork. We got it contracted this week and are very appreciative of her efforts. Over the holiday break a grant-funded electric air-to-water heat pump is being installed in the Fire Station equipment bays. We are exploring grants for FD rooftop solar which would make it free to heat the Fire Station, and I am making a pitch for internet-connected weather stations around town that would report on—among other things— the road surface temperature.

Highway, Tree Warden, Forest Committee, our private service forester, and MA DCR are working together to address hazard trees in the Gulf, those S turns on the portion of 78 called Winchester Rd. This is something that has been bothersome to those who look up for some time, and we want to accomplish removal in advance of new guardrails we will be installing with grant funding. The project includes the State dealing with their side of the road (the west side) and the Town on the eastern slope.

The recent Special Town Meeting accomplished our goal of getting legislative approval to enter a busing contract for five years. The contractor will transport our kids to high school and junior high and then run the same bus at no added cost over the roads at a different time for elementary. In addition, we authorized acquisition of a seven or eight passenger bus that we will own for student transportation. This will require a town employee driver. This owned short bus is to supplement, not replace, our need for a contracted big bus.

Seniors, mark your calendars for noon on Tuesdays for Senior Meal at Town Hall. No reservations are required, the food is good, and you might enjoy the company. Lastly, in the month of January the Selectboard will meet on Tuesdays because of the Monday holidays.

Epiphany

On their way back from having seen Jesus in the stable, they surely would have discussed this remarkable event, what they saw, and what they were feeling: the strong presence of some great power. And then it struck them. They HAD been in the presence of God. They had an epiphany that what they had seen, witnessed, and felt was in fact God being present in the stable with them. That day was for them, and eventually for all Christians, a landmark of the awareness of God being in our lives if we but look.

We should feel blessed and encouraged that we have the ability to feel and act when we recognize the presence and power of God beside and within us. We need to keep our eyes and hearts open to the possibility that God has tasks and actions for us to undertake to fulfil God's purpose of love, compassion, and caring for others. Feeding and helping the poor. Seeking justice in the operations of law and politics. For us to take on the tasks of assisting victims of war and the huge responsibility of ending war.

Let us pray that we too will have our own epiphanies to guide us in the direction where God would have us go.

The food is always fresh and tasty. The service is always nice, but be prepared for a wait. When we went for dinner we got there at 4:30 PM and were able to get in, but by the time we left the line was out the door. I met my nephew at 11:45 AM for lunch and the line was already long, but we got seated. Around the holidays there are lots of parties, so beware!

In addition to their regular menu, they have a whole page of "specials." Prices are "reasonable" on most items. I'm sure they had to go up on prices as did everyone, but they still give good portions and fresh food.

It's a short ride to Keene, and right before the first rotary you take a left and turn into the hotel parking lot. They are now attached to the hotel; no longer in the little building when it was Jim/Eddie's. I highly recommend it.
