The Town Hall will be closed on Monday, February 19th, for Washington's Birthday.








#### THEN, LET THE MUSIC BEGIN ...

#### From the Deacons' Desk

For years Lent has meant, for me, giving something up for a few weeks, forty days, a year. It had a certain similarity to my New Years' resolutions in which I tried, usually in vain, to "clean up my act" with a longer period of abstention from some "sinful" bad habit, i.e. smoking cigarettes or overeating, in an attempt to improve myself, or my health. Refraining from things I thought I shouldn't be indulging in.

However, there is much more to Lent than simply abstaining and holding oneself back from some "dark obsession."

Lent is a time when we can practice some meditation, reading or discussion with others, regarding the coming of Easter and Easter itself, one of Christianity's most important Holy Days. Meditation alone, with only ourselves to reflect on the significance of Easter. Giving up "habits" like drinking or desserts, movies, maybe cards. These are distractions, pleasurable distractions in our lives true, and there's nothing wrong with them in moderation. But distractions nonetheless, which at times can keep us from thoughtful contemplation on the spiritual nature of our lives and our role in helping God with its plan for a healthy spiritual life and life for all. Indulgences which can hinder our progress for spiritual development.

Lent offers a time to retreat for a few weeks from our preoccupations with acquisitions, favorite delights and entertainments. Retreat, not entirely of course, but taking a break from this whirlwind we call life. To spend time with God and ourselves.

Lent is also a time of remembering what we have, what we have been given, and what we can give back to God.

Lent lasts 40 days from Ash Wednesday to Holy Thursday, the Thursday before Easter, excluding Sundays. Sundays are an important part of Lent, but we do not include them in the "40 days."

Lent is 40 days in remembrance of Jesus's 40 days in the desert wilderness where he was challenged by the devil. Jesus refused the devil's offerings and ignored the devil's challenges thereby establishing that He, Jesus, was above the devil and unaffected by it.

Remember this is a time of quiet and contemplation. May these words inspire you and bring you the peace of your meditations and the hope of this season.

#### Coordinator Report for February 2024 Newsletter - David Young

It took longer than expected and we got what we wished for, a fiber optic cable system. Folks are beginning to move over to Spectrum from the town service. I expect about half to remain. If what the town has been providing has not been meeting your needs, you should move on. Even if you do not intend to subscribe you should get it installed. Having fast internet has been a contingency in many home sales and for some time. Having competing options is even better. As far as our customers with weak service goes, WBS will not have to work so hard to keep it functioning at your site. We can be more like a business and less like a mission society. WBS has charged \$50 since we started in 2009. If the prospect of the price popping up after Spectrum's introductory offering is over, have us leave our system in place. We will not do that on the licensed gear because of the \$6 monthly fee we pay for each of the licensed links, but we can leave the wire infrastructure in place just in case. A question of suspend or cancel.

Can Warwick broadband continue? Yes. We chose wireless because of the lower capital cost to build out. With lower investment we just did not need as many customers to operate. Spectrum does not either since they got \$3M of federal funds to pay for the system. Our goal at WBS has been to break even or even generate a modest margin. A year ago, we had \$220k of debt on WBS. We submitted a grant to Mass Broadband for \$200k where we argued that we welcome this competition to our monopoly business and need to be debt free. We got the grant and then we spent \$20k of our operating funds and the Town now owns the system free and clear. We also have more than \$100,000 of retained earnings from that modest margin we have attained over the years to backstop us from unanticipated financial hits. WBS has not been a cost to the property taxpayers and so shall remain. We recently connected the school, town hall, and fire station with a town owned fiber loop. This will save us money by using fewer fiber runs to Springfield from town.

Fire station construction is ongoing. Right now, we are getting a grant funded air to water heat pump for the hydronic system in the floor of the equipment bays installed. We are getting the walls insulated in the office addition and the lines for the air source heat pumps for the office area installed as well. The Building and Energy Committee are working on air sealing, the project is closed in. The project is being inspected, under supervision, and we expect completion by sometime in the summer. Representative Whipps got us a \$50k budget earmark and we got it under contract in January. Those funds are supporting the fire station's completion.

GC energy betterments are in motion. In addition to the work at the fire station, we are completing the electrification of the elementary school using ductless mini splits in the rest of the classrooms, the cafeteria, and the gymnasium. The Green Communities grant is also paying for high quality interior storm windows and some air sealing.

The spring that feeds the fountain had some line repairs and upgrades. We now have a good group of folks who are not retirement age involved. George Day has been carrying the weight for years, and he has done an excellent job documenting the system. Now we are in the process of conveying the knowledge to the next generation. This is excellent quality water, and we are working on a plan to reinstate this source to fire and police. The FD and PD water is served by a muddy well. While a line was being dug up and coupled to fix a leak, needed upgrades occurred in the vault where the distribution manifold and valves live. The interruption of water led to the demise of the pump we use at town hall to increase the pressure.

It is time for folks to think about producing their Departmental Town report for the next annual meeting. The reporting period is the prior fiscal year which ended June 30th, 2023. I urge folks accept the task while it is fresh in mind and not wait until we are beating the drums in March for your copy.
