Warwick Scholarship Committee A. George Day, Jr.

The Warwick Scholarship Committee is accepting applications for the scholarship awards for 2024. Students who have been accepted as a full time student in an accredited post-secondary school and have been a resident of Warwick for one year or more are eligible.

(Article II Eligibility)

- a. The applicant must be a resident of Warwick for one year or more preceding application.
- b. Seniors in the graduating class at Pioneer Valley Regional School, Franklin County Vocational Technical School, other secondary schools and home-schooled students are eligible.
- c. Students in accredited post-secondary schools are eligible.
- d. A student is limited to two scholarships awards from the Warwick Community Committee, either from the Warwick Community Scholarship fund or the Alice, Eric, Oscar Anderson Scholarship fund.
- e. The Anita L. Pike Memorial Scholarship is awarded to any graduating senior from a public high school with the highest scholastic average and going on to college.

Application forms and current by-laws are available at the Guidance Department of Pioneer Valley Regional School or at the Warwick Public Library. Applications must be received prior to April 15th. The Green Corner

It was the *last* thing I wanted to do on a drizzly, gray Saturday, but the Subaru was packed and it had to be done. My GPS showed the route and hot coffee was topped up. After years of not having the heart to toss any styrofoam into our Transfer Station's trash, the pile in my basement had grown and now demanded a solution.

For years we've lived with the belief that this material is indestructible and totally un-recyclable, unusable...a dismal reality of our material world. And yet, hadn't there been a Green Corner article several years ago mentioning a company that offered a minor miracle in the world of recycling? Google! <u>Gold Circuit E-Cycling, LLC, An Environmentally Conscious Materials Recycling Company.</u>

The dread of driving through Springfield to Silver Street in Agawam faded as I got closer to Gold Circuit, a facility that had a welcoming and a user-friendly website. Their site posts clear pictures of what is and is not accepted, states there's no need to make an appointment or be a resident of Agawam, and it gives a number where you can text any questions. Despite being just one drop-in-the-bucket carload of styrofoam, this felt like exactly the right thing to be doing. The mission was to see first-hand how it works and to bring info back to Warwick.

I met Matt, the founder and owner of the company, who told me, "We're in competition with the landfills. It's all about volume." He rolled a huge cardboard box down a ramp from an enormous warehouse, and we tossed in my unwanted cargo. He said that it's difficult for small towns to store the styrofoam until pickup. (Matt has a 26' box truck which could make a pickup from Warwick for a fee of \$200.) He explained, "We densify the styrofoam in our machine to make weight in blocks. There is a video at https://www.RecycleYourFoam.com. The end product goes to manufacturers to make wall board insulation foam...Otherwise, we just keep doing what we're doing." I thanked him for his time and drove my empty Subaru to the 91 N ramp, my mind full of exciting possibilities for Warwick.

- ⇒ Is this something we want to explore?
- ⇒ Might we be able to work with any other towns?
- ⇒ Where could we store the styrofoam until enough is collected for transport?

Coordinator Report for March 2024

Unless you are proofreading this for the newsletter, by the time you read these thoughts we will have about three weeks of winter left to endure or enjoy, depending on your perspective. I would like you to meet a guy who has been getting us through winter. Matt Dorgan is our new highway superintendent. Matt has been assisted by resident Ed Matthews in the transition, and the commissioners recently hired Mike Truehart who has a lot of heavy equipment experience including maintenance and repairs and is interested in getting involved in our grant writing. We are optimistic that this team can ably serve Warwick. In addition to keeping after snow and ice and continuing repairs from flood damage that occurred almost two years ago, our highway department has two-million-dollar construction grants. A contractor is completing a guard rail grant now, and we will have a big paving job on Winchester road / route 78 coming up. Hazardous and potentially hazardous trees in the Rt. 78 gulf are being addressed by the state DCR for their part and by the town. By the time you are reading this newsletter you may have experienced road closures. Look to Code Red to keep you updated. A decision was made to close the road and detour rather than try to run a single lane through this zone.

Town departments, commissions, and committees take note: It is time to submit your report for the annual town report. This is on fiscal year and the period is July 1, 2022, through June 30th, 2023. We need this no later than April 1st. You can email it to townreport@town.warwick.ma.us

Your Selectboard learned that long-term building inspector Phil Delorey is retiring, leaving four towns in need of a building commissioner. I first met Phil when I was running a nonprofit Community Development Corp, and he was Athol's building inspector. We convinced him to take us on after he retired, and we had an opening. He is going to be 75 and is calling it quits. The town seriously considered becoming a member of the council of government's FRCOG shared service, and that would have been a good option. We are fortunate to have an even better one. Resident Brian Gale has agreed to serve as commissioner while Justin Gale operates under him on a waiver while he seeks the necessary credentials. This is like an apprenticeship and is the typical on-the-job training path for building inspectors. This option has two noticeably clear advantages. One: it keeps the inspection program in town and two: it is more budget-friendly, as Justin has agreed to take on the job for the funds we have been budgeting. It surely takes a village.

Other needs the Town has include a couple of folks to serve on the six-town regional district agreement committee. And with the recent death of Art Long, we have now two vacancies on zoning board of appeals. ZBA is appointed. Let us talk. And note that the annual town meeting is Monday, May 6th, and the town elections are Monday, May 20th.

I got an email from Senator Marky today about congressionally-directed spending. That is defined as earmarks. Warwick was fortunate to get one of those earmarks from State Representative Susie Whipps' efforts. It was for \$50,000 and we are using it to finish the fire station. We are on track to complete the fire station by early fall.

Seniors, you are invited to our every Tuesday Senior Meal at Town Hall. Come and join us for tasty food and company. Reservations are not accepted nor required. The project is supported by your donations.

Finally, I want recognize resident Phil Simon for the great work he is doing at the Shay Theater in Turners Falls. It is great to have these high-quality local events he is booking that keep me out past my bedtime. There's great stuff happening at the Colonial in Keene and at Stone Church in Brattleboro, too.


