MEMORIAL DAY SERVICE

Green Corner – Timber HP Wood Fiber Insulation

Now that winter has lost its grip on our psyche, we can stop fretting about ways to keep warm. That said, this is probably the best time of year to plan for winters to come.

When we think about keeping warm, basically we can either burn something or put on more clothes.

Same with our homes.

We burn oil or wood or propane. Even if we use an electric heat pump for heating and cooling, the power company is likely burning something to make steam to turn the turbines to turn the generator.

To "clothe" our home, we use insulation.

To block the wind, we use air sealing techniques.

Now - what kind of insulation?

Turns out there is a new kid on the block, made right here in Maine using waste wood chips that would normally be used to make paper. It has been used in Europe for over two decades, but it was silly to ship it over here.

One of the best things about it (besides being non-toxic and non-flammable) is that it is made from a resource that grows right here – trees – and those trees have grown by absorbing carbon from the atmosphere, and now that carbon will be locked up in your home, keeping you warm for decades. Meanwhile, you'll burn less wood or oil or propane every year and be more comfortable to boot.

Other types of insulation are usually made from oil (foams) or sand (fiberglass) or rocks (mineral wool) and some have very high environmental costs during the manufacturing process, not to mention nowhere to put it during the de-construction process, or the awful emissions should they burn, or the unhealthy effects on the workers during installation.

Hamshaw Lumber now carries the Timber HP wood fiber insulation in loose fill (like cellulose) and in batt form (like fiberglass), and soon board form (like XPS and EPS - blue and white foam boards), in various thicknesses.

On April 29 & 30, Energia insulation company will be using the loose fill product to beef up the insulation level in the attic of the new Fire Station. Drop in and grab a handful - feeling is believing!

Spring 2024 "Clean Sweep" Bulky Waste Recycling Day

Franklin County Solid Waste Management District is holding the Spring 2024 "Clean Sweep" Bulky Waste Recycling Day on Saturday, May 11 from 9 a.m. to noon. The three drop-off sites are: Erving Senior Center at 1 Care Dr (off Rt. 63) (*note new site instead of Northfield Highway Garage*); Mohawk Trail Regional School at 26 Ashfield Rd. (Route 112 South); and Whately Transfer Station at 73 Christian Lane.

Residents from any of the District's 21 member towns may bring bulky items such as tires, appliances, scrap metal, furniture, carpeting, construction debris, computers, televisions, propane gas tanks, and other large items. Materials will be recycled whenever possible.

There are charges for most items. Disposal fees, cash only, will be collected during check-in at each site. A complete list of prices for the most common items is at: <u>franklincountywastedistrict.org</u>. The price list will also be provided to participating town halls and transfer stations. Residents and businesses do not need to pre-register for the collection.

Mattresses and box springs will not be accepted at this event. There are 6 regional mattress recycling locations across Franklin County. These sites are open various hours year-round. See this webpage for locations, pricing and hours: <u>franklincountywastedistrict.org/mattress-recycling</u>. If you are unsure if your mattress and box spring can be recycled, call the District office at 413-772-2438.

Electronics are accepted at the event, but residents are also encouraged to recycle computer equipment and televisions at their town's transfer station, or at Greenfield Transfer Station. Staples stores accept computer equipment (no TVs) free of charge: call store for details.

Clean, dry textiles and books will be accepted for free reuse or recycling. Textiles must be contained inside a sturdy plastic bag. Textiles are now banned from the trash in Massachusetts. Textile recycling accepts 95% of all textiles and shoes, including clothing or linens that are torn, stained, with missing buttons or broken zippers. Damaged textiles can be sold to manufacturers that make insulation or shop rags. Acceptable items include CLEAN & DRY clothing, shoes, and accessories; plus curtains, sheets, towels and stuffed animals in any condition (except moldy or wet). Books can be in any condition (except moldy or wet) and can be hardcover or paperback. No encyclopedias.

Bulky Rigid Plastics will be collected separately for a special recycling program; \$5 per load of acceptable items. This special recycling program only accepts these items: 5-gallon pails, plastic lawn furniture, plastic trash barrels, recycling bins, laundry baskets, storage totes, and milk crates. Bulky rigid plastic items must be empty.

Consider reuse: before sending items for disposal or recycling, see if someone else can use them. Various charities and non-profits accept donations of working electronics, including local Salvation Army and Goodwill stores. Always call ahead to ask if they can accept your item. Or, offer items for reuse on a local "Buy Nothing" Facebook group, Freecycle group, or local town groups such as NextDoor.

Warwick Transfer Station Reminder

In addition to the regular Saturday hours, the Transfer Station is also open every other Wednesday evening (first and third of the month) with hours from 3 to 7 p.m. During the summer, the Wednesday schedule will revert to what you are accustomed to, July through the Wed after Labor Day.

Museum Passes: The Warwick Library has free/discounted admission passes to the Brattleboro Museum of Arts & Culture, the Eric Carle Museum of Picture Book Art, the Clark Museum, Historic Deerfield, Magic Wings Butterfly Museum, MassMOCA, Mass. State Parks (DCR Free Parking Pass), the New England Botanical Garden, OIC Makerspace (See review below) and The Trustees of Reservations.

NEW - Trustees (TTOR) GO Pass: A GO Pass can be used at any of the Trustees' natural and cultural sites that charges admission, except at parking kiosks or at special events or programs. One pass covers admission for up to two adults and any children under 18 at a single property. Not every Trustees property charges an admission fee, as many are free to the public already. Visit thetrustees.org for a specific property's admission policy.

Using the OIC Makerspace - by Thomas Ratte: I had my mind blown this winter, in Orange of all places. I'd been hearing about Launchspace, a makerspace in the OIC building (the old mattress factory), and used Warwick Library's free passes to have a look and try it out. WOW!!!! That was my immediate response when I walked in, and my enthusiasm and amazement has not retreated one inch since. After my original shock at the size and breadth of the facility I was given a tour to familiarize myself with the various stations and rooms. The list is almost overwhelming. It's like a playground for creatives of all types. There are sewing machines, both table top and industrial, embroidery and sergers. There is a leather-working station with wonderful tools for all kinds of sculptural as well as utilitarian uses. There is silkscreen printing and laser etching and cutting and 3D printers. You can make jewelry and there is a metal shop with lots of equipment. And finally—the woodshop!

An orientation with the very knowledgeable shop steward familiarized me with the machines and safety procedures. The stewards were very helpful and patient with my questions and helped me avoid getting into bad habits. After several uses of the library pass, and making half a dozen or more cutting boards, I joined OIC as a member for a \$60 monthly fee. Now I've made 16 cutting/serving/ bread boards, a few spindles and a bowl I turned from a cherry burl from my backyard. I've sewn a few bags for the boards and look forward to making some pottery and probably a leather-bound book. The possibilities are only restricted by my imagination.

If you have any interest in making art or craft or just useful things for around the house, I cant overstate how helpful the staff and other members are for reaching that goal. Classes are also available for some of the more demanding offerings. The Library Pass is free for Saturday afternoon sessions. One pass is good for two people, and a family of four can use two passes. Happy making!

Beginner's Backyard Herbalism Workshop: Tuesday, May 14 @ 7 pm: Join veteran herbalist Sue Paquet of Warwick for an introduction to some easy ways of utilizing common wild and cultivated plant allies. Many common weeds and culinary plants contain little-known medicinal properties that are great for use in homemade tinctures, liniments, infused oils, oxymels, compresses or simple teas. Medicinal plants can bring joy and enhance our lives with some awareness, informed caution and little bit of effort. Come and enjoy this informal discussion and demonstration with Sue, who has 20+ years of hands-on experience as a gardener/herbalist/forager and former off-grid homesteader.

Author Talk with AgathaO: Thursday, May 23rd @ 7 pm: The library is pleased to host Plainfield author and photographer AgathaO (alter ego of historian Pleun Bouricius). She will be reading selections from her newly-published collection of essays and photos, *Northern Byways and Other Essays from the Road*, a "windshield survey of the lay of the land across the thinly populated expanses that most of us Americans and Canadians profess to love." She and her travel companion, the Carpenter, bring you along on a journey of discovery of how we have shaped our landscapes. The volume is also a commentary on the value of books, reading, and research in a world where facts are currency and seemingly malleable at the same time. There will be time for conversation and signing to follow the reading.

Monthly Short Story Hour - Stephen Millhauser: Thursday, May 30th (5th Thursday) @ 7:30 pm. This month we'll read selections from *Disruptions*, the 2023 collection by Stephen Millhauser. Greetings from the Community Garden. Our first outreach is to ask for tips, tricks, and recipes that you might like to share in the newsletter. We will choose one each month from June to October. I will start with my contribution which is how to identify Stinging Nettles.

Stinging nettles form a large bed on the right side of the community garden, and occasionally they wander under the fence into the garden and can be a problem for bare feet and fingers. If you pick your own herbs or other "pick your own" crops, please wear shoes (that cover your feet) and have gloves with you. Stinging Nettles really sting, but if harvested carefully (with gloved hands), they can be dried or boiled and added to soup, teas, and tinctures.

I recommend the book "The Forager's Guide to Wild Food" by Nicole Apelian PHD.

WARWICK COMMUNITY SCHOOL NEWS

Happy May,

We hope you are enjoying the first days of spring! To celebrate the season, we invite you to join us on Saturday, May 11th for Spring Community Beautification Day. We will gather at the school from 1:00 - 4:00 p.m. to weed, plant and take care of a variety of small projects to improve our woodland campus.

We are pleased to share that we have had a successful first year of rigorous and highly engaging learning. In preparation for year two, at Town Meeting on May 6th, we will be asking for your support with our 2024-2025 school budget. We have stayed well within our 2023-2024 budget due to careful planning and an enormous amount of grant writing. In fact, we regularly won grants, bringing in \$124,500 (not including entitlement grants, such as Title I). We will continue to fundraise and write grants next year and in future years. The school committee and I are seeking an increase in our budget as well and hope that the town will support this increase. In addition to some costs that cannot be helped, such as rising transportation costs, this increase in budget will allow us to:

- Open an inclusive junior kindergarten classroom for children who require special education support. This will prevent us from having to send our youngest residents to other towns to meet their needs.
- Offset lower than hoped for state funding.
- Fully fund our administrative assistant/director of operations, who does everything from answer the phone, to schedule the town's use of the building, to oversee the lunch program and library, to manage payroll and so much more!
- Increase the hours we are able to have a qualified nurse on site.

As we work to open a junior kindergarten "preschool" classroom at WCS in the coming year, we are looking to locate any three, four or five-year-olds who live in or outside Warwick and who might be interested in enrolling. Students who live outside of Warwick would pay tuition and would support the school with added revenue.

I have always enjoyed going to Baldwinville Station for breakfast, and recently when I went it was for lunch and I was very impressed with their lunch menu. 


