
#### Appreciation

Memories of the Past

During World War II, when I was a young boy, there was a shortage of available men in town to fill some of the necessary jobs that needed to be done, such as when the town was getting ready to pave the Orange Road in the vicinity of Bakers Flat and Barber Hill. Lee Dresser, who was road boss at the time, recruited us boys to help. There was Donny Lincoln, Arthur Flag, Glen Copland, Mickey Brown, and a few others whose names I don't remember. We gathered at the old town barn and were loaded into the back of the truck that Clark Dunkley drove. We went down to a sand pit located on Wendell Road just up from across Shaw Road. There, Clark had us dig an area where he could back his truck in close to the sand bank.

He called the shovels he had handed out banjos because of the way they were shaped. It became very evident that most of us were not tall enough to shovel into the truck at ground level. Clark had us dig flat spots higher up on the bank to shovel from. This made it easy for us to reach the truck and we all started digging as fast as we could. After a few minutes Clark stopped us and said, "Now, I'm going to show you a way to shovel that will allow you to keep at it longer and get more done." He told us to go slower and straighten up as we threw each shovel full into the truck because if we kept shoveling like mad men bent over like that we would collapse in a few minutes and never get the truck loaded. After what seemed like forever we got the truck full and he chose two of us to go with him as another truck came backing in. I was chosen to go and was happy to leave the pit. When we got to the location to be tarred, Clark showed us how to shovel little piles every few feet, as he drove the truck along the side of the road. We did this on both sides of the road until the truck was empty before going back to the pit for another load. I don't remember how long it took to get as many sand piles as were needed but I do remember doctoring the blisters I got. After that was done well enough to satisfy Lee Dresser, he told us not to come in the next day and he would call when he needed us again.

A few days later we got the word to come back and when we got to the town barn they had a pile of sand off to the side. Clark called us over to show us how to use the shovels to spread the sand. There was a board a short way from the pile of sand and he showed us how to swing our shovels to spread sand just short of that board. He had us all practice until we could do it properly. Back at the Barber Hill site, he placed us by the little sand piles and when the tar truck came through spraying tar we spread those sand piles over the tar. After that side was covered we moved over to the other side to shovel those piles as the tar truck came back on the opposite side. Though some of the bigger boys went back to work once in a while, for us smaller boys this was our only experience working on the road gang. When I think of those times over 70 years ago, I remember how we used to think of Clark before then, as that grumpy old man who drives the town truck. Looking back now, I see him as a kindly man who had a lot of patience with us young boys, teaching us the true value of working hard and doing a job right. It was an experience I will always remember.

Did you know? Radishes are one of the easiest plants to grow, and when left to flower will attract beneficial insects which help control common pests such as aphids.

Let those flowers become seed pods and you've got another tasty treat when fresh and green, or let them dry and save the seeds for next years garden.

When harvested for roots, each radish plant will produce only one, but a single radish plant will produce tens or even hundreds of edible pods.

The best radishes for edible pods are Rat's Tail, Dragon's Tail, Munchen Bier, and Dingara.


#### Warwick's Nature, Cultural, and Arts Summer Program

**NEW - Trustees (TTOR) GO Pass**: A GO Pass can be used at any of the Trustees' natural and cultural sites that charges admission, except at parking kiosks or at special events or programs. One pass covers admission for up to two adults and any children under 18 at a single property. Not every Trustees property charges an admission fee, as many are free to the public already. **Warwick Library - from 1898 state report**: "In the summer of 1815 a circulating library was organized in Warwick, a small sum being charged for the privilege of taking books. This library was kept up as a private enterprise until 1871, when it was given to the town, which had, the preceding fall, appropriated the sum of \$100 towards establishing a public library. Its use now became free to all the inhabitants of the town, each family being allowed four books at a time... It was kept in rooms in a dwelling-house until January, 1895, when it was removed to a room in the new town hall building. This room is light, pleasant and convenient, but will soon be to small." [In 1917 the Baptist Church offered its Meeting House to the Town for use as a public library, which commenced, after renovation, in 1919 on the Library's present site; 1998 saw a major addition, bring the building to its current configuration.]
