COMMUNITY GARDEN NEWS

Borage (*Borago officinalis*) is another beneficial plant to consider adding to your garden, especially near tomato plants, for several reasons:

1. ****Attracting pollinators:**** Borage produces beautiful blue flowers that are highly attractive to bees and other pollinators. Having borage in your garden can help attract pollinators that are essential for the fertilization of tomato plants, leading to better fruit set and higher yields.
2. ****Improving soil health:**** Borage is a dynamic accumulator plant, meaning it has deep roots that can mine nutrients from the soil and bring them closer to the surface where they can be accessed by other plants, such as tomato plants. When the borage plant dies back, it decomposes and releases these nutrients back into the soil, enriching it for neighboring plants.
3. ****Natural pest control:**** Borage is known to repel certain pests such as tomato hornworms, which can be a common problem for tomato plants. By planting borage near your tomatoes, you may help deter these pests and reduce the need for chemical insecticides.
4. ****Companion planting benefits:**** Borage is considered a good companion plant for tomatoes because it can enhance the flavor and growth of tomatoes when grown nearby. Some gardeners believe that planting borage near tomatoes can improve the overall health and vigor of the tomato plants.
5. ****Edible and medicinal uses:**** Borage is also valued for its culinary and medicinal properties. The flowers are edible and can be used to garnish salads or beverages, and the leaves can be used in cooking. Borage is also known for its potential health benefits, such as anti-inflammatory properties.

In summary, planting borage near your tomato plants can attract pollinators, improve soil health, act as a natural pest deterrent, provide companion planting benefits, and offer additional edible and medicinal uses, making it a valuable addition to your garden.

Blooming now in the Community Garden - flowers can be eaten and add a lovely touch to salads. **Be careful where you plant Borage - it is toxic to dogs.**

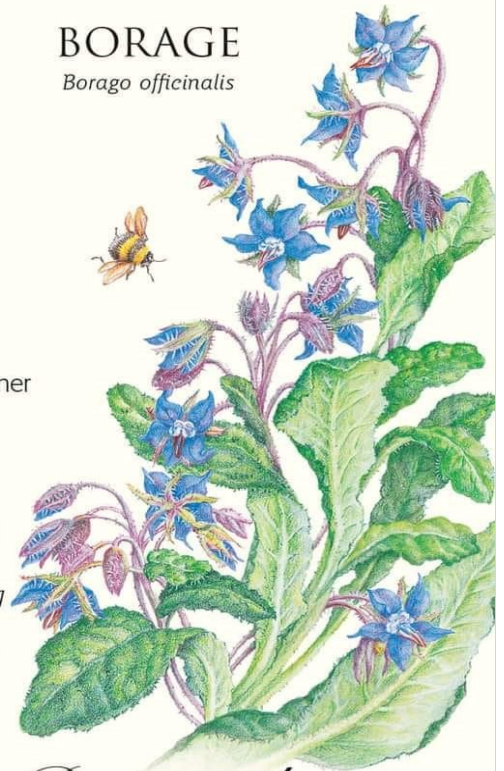

TOWN CLOCK NEWS

Citizens of Warwick who live within earshot of the town clock may have noticed that the bell has gone silent. I have disabled it due to excessive wear of one of the components that control ringing the bell to prevent further damage. The clock is still running and keeping time, and I have consulted a tower clock company that advised me on what to do. This company, D 'Avanza Clock Repair LLC in Goffstown NH, is the same company that did major repairs in 2007-2008 after the cable on the 500 lb. weight that drives the strike mechanism broke, causing considerable damage. There are not many clock repair people around anymore who work on tower clocks, and they cover the whole northeast region and have several jobs going at once; so, they have added us to the list but could not give me a time estimate for the repairs at this time. I will keep in touch with them to make sure we are not forgotten.

The town clock was gifted to the town by Mrs. Martha Clapp and Sisters in memory of their mother Mary Blake Clapp in 1884 and was installed in the Meeting House in 1894. It is a beautiful timepiece and has served our town for 130 years. Over those years there have been 16 clock keepers including myself; most notably my predecessor, A. George Day Jr., clock keeper for 50 years from 1967 to 2017.

When I worked in Keene some years ago, I used to go to lunch here quite frequently. So, when a friend offered to take me out for breakfast to celebrate my birthday, I said, "How about The Pub?"

We got there at about 9 AM on a Saturday, and the place was so packed that they ran out of menus, but the people across from us gave us theirs, since they were ready to order. I opted for the steak-and-eggs breakfast which included a small steak, two eggs, home fries, and your choice of toast or homemade biscuits. My friend had an omelet with extra stuff in it, as you could build your own omelet. Hers came with home fries and toast or biscuits.

I was a little disappointed in the steak, as it had a strip of fat down the middle and was quite chewy. The eggs were a perfect over easy, but the home fries could have been a little hotter. The biscuits were very dry, and I had to ask for butter which took quite a while to get.

Museum Passes: The Warwick Library has free/discounted admission passes to the Brattleboro Museum of Arts & Culture, the Eric Carle Museum of Picture Book Art, the Clark Museum, Historic Deerfield, Magic Wings Butterfly Museum, MassMOCA, Mass. State Parks (DCR Free Parking Pass), the New England Botanical Garden, OIC Makerspace and The Trustees of Reservations Go Pass.

NEW - Trustees (TTOR) GO Pass: A GO Pass can be used at any of the Trustees' natural and cultural sites that charges admission, except at parking kiosks or at special events or programs. One pass covers admission for up to two adults and any children under 18 at a single property. Not every Trustees property charges an admission fee, as many are free to the public already. Visit thetrustees.org for a specific property's admission policy.

Prepare a Recipe from the *Original White House Cook Book* (1887): The Library is in possession of an immaculate copy of this beloved item, with gold-gilted pages! (Ok, it's a 2003 reprint.) The Cookbook will be on view at the Library for the next few months for patrons to peruse and select a favorite—to be prepared and shared at a Fall event. Do you want learn how to make more use of the internet, learn new skills, and connect with your neighbors? If so, you might be interested in a new initiative that aims to create a space for digital equity and community building in Warwick. We are lucky to have places where we can gather, learn, and socialize in our town.

We have the Library, which offers books, music, programs, copy and fax, and computers. We have events and activities sponsored by the town government and nonprofits held at the Town Hall, such as concerts and exercise classes. We have lectures and workshops at the library. We have some community activities revolving around the elementary school, and around the TCC's free food, movie night and the community garden.

But we also have a new opportunity to create another space that can serve our needs and interests. We have the Tavern at the Warwick Inn, and its owner, Lisa Vander Stelt, is interested in making it available to the community as a center for digital access, education, and a regular place to gather.

This is not about competing with any of the existing venues, but rather an addition to them. We want to create a space where people can come to use the internet, learn new skills, and connect with each other. We want to offer information and education about using devices, selecting new devices, understanding and avoiding tech fraud, and learning new skills. We want to make this space accessible, welcoming, consistent with its hours of operation, and fun for everyone.

To introduce this idea and get your feedback, we have planned three events in July. The first one is an open house of the social community center, which will be held on Sunday, July 7th, from 1 to 3 pm, concurrent with the ice cream social. You can see the space, enjoy some ice cream, and chat with us about your thoughts and suggestions. The second event is a free technology help day, which will be held on Thursday, July 18, from 9 am to 12 pm. You can bring your devices and your questions, and we will have staff from Warwick Broadband to help you out. Whether you need help setting up email on your phone, figuring out what is available in terms of free streaming TV, or making a streaming device like a Fire stick, a Chromecast, or a Roku work for you, we can assist you. The third event is a screening of one of the recent Warwick community history video recordings, which will be held on Thursday, July 25, from 10 am to noon. You can watch the video on a big screen and learn more about the history and culture of our town. We will also show you how to refine searches on the internet including YouTube, so you can find more videos of interest.

We envision the center, which needs a better name, as eventually being consistently open weekdays in the morning, from 9 am to noon. We hope that this will be a convenient time for many people, especially seniors, parents, and home-based workers. We are excited about this initiative, and we hope you are, too. We believe that digital equity and community building are important goals for our town, and we want to make them happen. Please join us for the events in July and let us know what you think. We look forward to hearing from you and seeing you soon.

A capital planning effort is underway. The next and second meeting is at Town Hall at 3:30 pm on Tuesday, July 9. We are incentivized because—besides having \$1/2M in our capital savings—we are getting our divorce settlement from leaving Pioneer. This is our percentage share of the district's equity and special funds, and it is \$303k that will become free cash once certified by the state next fall. We need consensus over a long-range plan and use it to guide our decisions. Our new school district has been budgeting for two years. Our goal is a 20-year plan. Once the membership has gelled, we will seek official appointment. Until then I am posting these as public meetings and taking minutes thought at this date we are in formation. You are invited to join us. The same Zoom link will be in use as for Selectboard meetings; however, if the telemeeting portion fails, we will soldier on.
