## Warwick Community School Brings Learning to Life with Project-Based Learning

At Warwick Community School, part of the mission and vision of WCS is the implementation of Project-Based Learning (PBL) in which students are immersed in hands-on, engaging projects that foster creativity, perseverance, and collaboration while learning core academics. Our version of PBL not only aligns with state curriculum standards but also emphasizes social-emotional learning, guided by the CARES framework: Cooperation, Accountability, Responsibility, Empathy, and Self-Control (Center for Responsive Schools, n.d.), as well as boosting our students' sociopolitical consciousness, aligned with our school-wide efforts at exemplifying culturally and linguistically responsive practices.

A shining example of PBL in action at WCS is the 3rd/4th grade class play, led by mentor teacher Nettie Harrington Pangallo. This year, students are producing a historical play set during the Revolutionary War. The project incorporates multiple learning objectives: students are building background knowledge about this pivotal era in history while empathizing with diverse perspectives based on political viewpoints, exploring how loyalists and patriots navigated relationships with each other. Each student read about and wrote essays examining what led different people to become loyalists or patriots, further developing their critical thinking and writing skills.

In addition to academic growth, students are mastering speech and language standards by learning to read with prosody and confidence as they rehearse their lines. Mathematics and the engineering process come into play as they design and construct sets for the production. This collaborative effort has been supported by generous community donations of props and construction materials—thank you to all who contributed so far: the Maliskas, Youngs, Romansons, and the Greenfield Home Depot.

The culmination of this hard work will be a performance on Thursday, February 13, at 5 p.m. in the Warwick Community School gymnasium; all are invited to attend! This event is not just a showcase of student talent but also a celebration of how PBL inspires young learners to think creatively, persevere through challenges, and produce tangible outcomes for an audience beyond the classroom.

We are proud of our students' dedication and invite the entire community to join us for this special evening. Come witness how PBL is transforming education at Warwick Community School!

## Coordinator for February 2025 Newsletter - David Young

We have done a lot of work at the school addressing both security and energy use/occupant comfort over the years in most town structures. My priority is cost savings and fortunately our “decarbonization” work aligns nicely because we do not attempt it without addressing air leaks and insulation. We are converting to customer-owned propane tanks at the elementary school which will reduce our cost of gas for kitchen and back up generator by a half and we can shop around like folks do for fuel oil. How? Own your own tank.

Other betterments underway right now address safety and include getting remote electronic locking capability installed on three sets of doors at the elementary school. With a Justice department grant we were able to upgrade the telephone system to a hybrid system that lets us connect via plain old telephone lines, IP phone, Spectrum phone, and with a little workaround cellular. This upgrade made use of the existing wiring and changed the electronics. We also installed a multi-camera video security array. Much of this work at our school was grant funded.

After initially agreeing to serve every home in Warwick, Spectrum has stepped back from that commitment to the dismay of our residents who live off grid. The Selectboard is addressing this issue. The Charter / Spectrum company got \$3 million of federal funds in a reverse auction. The way these things work is the low bidder gets the award for subsidy and builds. Initially Spectrum wanted something less than \$30,000 to instead serve everyone and, before the franchise agreement was inked, they said “no we can do it all” meaning no need for a town contribution. In the last year there have been meetings with their construction side and our Highway Commission and a permit to trench on Beech Hill has been granted. Then they sent somebody new who did not know anything and clearly did have the power to say yes, proceed. That is where we are on the 20th of January. It occurs to me that a little consumer muscle could help here. Because it was one year ago that Spectrum began offering service here, and while Warwick Broadband has retained more than 60% of our customers, the \$50 come on price from Spectrum for internet is going to spike on you soon. Some of you would be well advised not to come back to Warwick Broadband. It is after all wireless and wireless is location dependent. If you cancel their service for the internet, know that you can keep those massive savings on your telephone bill even if you cancel the internet, something to consider. You can have their TV without buying their Internet too. If you wonder if your site is one of those hard to serve ones that made the town wireless network better by your leaving, feel free to call me and ask. It is time to hold feet to the fire. A deal is a deal.

Our Highway Commission and superintendent and crew have by most accounts been doing a commendable job. It has been especially difficult due to the age and condition of some of our trucks. We just replaced a 2009 IHC with a 2016 Western Star. If you saw it broken down relax, it was only a radiator hose. On the matter of town needs, there is a group of us meeting on occasional Tuesday afternoons to work on a capital plan which addresses highways, school, general government, and other town capital needs. One of the things on our radar that may not be so obvious is the First Parish Meeting House, the former Unitarian church which sits on town land, the common, and houses the town clock. Reach out to me if you would like to be involved in some capacity with this planning.

Our digital equity work continues each Thursday from 9:00 a.m. to noon at the Tavern at the Warwick Inn on Hotel Road across from Town Hall. To define DE as we see the need, it is where you can come to get help with your devices and with technology. We have a grant that is paying rent beginning January 1, and we are going to be opening for this purpose and to provide a place for residents to congregate and socialize. More hours of operation are going to require some staffing or volunteers. A \$35,000 grant from the lieutenant governor's office is providing support for our aging in place and elder social isolation mitigation work. To that we are overlaying what we can do with \$50,000 of digital equity money. This is what the state decided to do with funds in the realization that it is great to have fast internet which we have worked hard on, but the next step is using it. (Continued on next page.)

Warwick joined the AARP Network of Age-Friendly States and Communities on December 22, 2021. This initiative, led by the Franklin County and North Quabbin Regional Age-Friendly Coalition, focuses on enhancing various aspects of community life to support residents of all ages. LifePath, in partnership with the Franklin Regional Council of Governments (FRCOG), has been developing and implementing the regional Age- and Dementia-Friendly Action Plan for 2024-2028, aiming to improve the quality of life for older adults in the area. We are overlaying the digital equity activity in the same public space.

At the town owned McKnight property, more testing to determine point source of pollution. There is no planned reuse and that is by intent. We took it for back taxes and once cleaned up we can have a community process to chart a reuse. If the taking is perceived as "anticipatory" to a use, we will not be able to get state and federal grants for mitigation. If in doubt, ask Leverette about their polluted library site.

At the Town Beach we plan to remove pine tree per the request of the Beach Committee approved by the Select-board. That is if the ice is thick enough this winter. It was -13 degrees last night with more to come. Until next time stay safe and stay warm.

Letter to Warwick Residents 12.20.2024

Holiday Greetings!

Recently I co-authored a Letter to the Editor of the Greenfield Recorder in my capacity as Chairperson of the Six Town Regionalized Planning Board (STRPB). Because I also have the honor of serving as Chairperson of the Warwick School Committee it may have caused some confusion about our School Committee's stance on this initiative. The purpose of this article is threefold: address the School Committee's position; provide an update on the STRPB's remaining work; and, provide some historical context relating to the inception of the Six Town Regional Planning Board.

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First, the **Warwick School Committee** has not taken a position on this topic and all options for educating its students will be considered, including tuitioning middle and high school students to Pioneer and/or Mahar Regional School Districts, as well as becoming a member of the proposed Pre-k -12 school district.

The Warwick School Committee consists of 5 members and we work together very well. We are respectful of all points of view in our discussions before we vote. The STRPB is in the process of crafting a proposed regional agreement. Once this document is finalized, it will be shared with the towns and included on a School Committee agenda for review and discussion. This agreement will not be ready for the upcoming Annual Town Meeting.

I will be writing additional newspaper articles in the months ahead on behalf of the Planning Board. Please note, I am doing so as a citizen and resident of Warwick, NOT as the Chair of the Warwick School Committee.

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Second, the **STRPB** created a District Regional Agreement Subcommittee (DRAS) with representatives from each town to craft a proposed Regional Agreement under the leadership of the MARS Consulting Group. They are making good progress and should reach the halfway point by the end of January. When finished, the draft proposed Regional Agreement will be sent to the full STRPB for their review/recommendation and then forwarded to the towns.

A number of Public Hearings will be scheduled to review and answer questions in each town. You will be invited to attend as many as you want in the six towns of Bernardston, Gill, Leyden, Montague, Northfield and Warwick.

In the Fall of 2025 the towns will be asked to vote on this document. If one town does not vote in the affirmative, the proposed regional agreement fails and the process stops. If it passes, then there is another year and ½ for the transition period while a governance structure is put in place and a transitional superintendent is hired. The proposed district would not begin its operations until 2027. More details on this will be explained at the public hearings.

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**Historical Context:** The four towns in the Pioneer Valley Regional School District created the HEART (Honest, Education, And Retaining Trust) Committee in 2017 (of which I was a member) to explore potential efficiencies that might be implemented in the district and reviewed the impact of declining enrollment and increased costs. Additionally, they were charged with proposing revisions to the regional agreement.

Concurrently, the Towns of Gill and Montague were also concerned about the impact of declining enrollment on students and escalating costs. These shared concerns was the impetus of the towns voting to form the STRPB which held its first meeting in November of 2019. Its charge was to research the feasibility and sustainability of a proposed 6 town regional school district. At that time Warwick was a member of the Pioneer Valley Regional District. However, when Pioneer closed our school the community withdrew from the Pioneer District and formed its own Prek-12 school district. I then joined the Warwick School Committee to help set up its governance structure and prepare for its opening.

Although lengthy, I hope this communication was helpful.

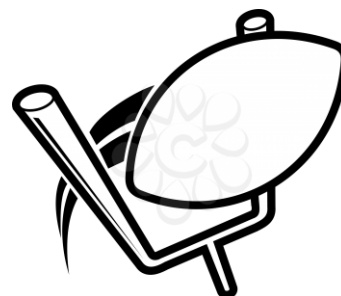

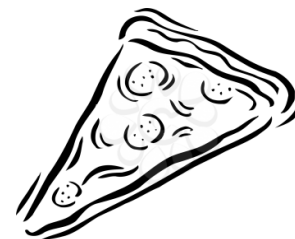
