Up for May 5th Town Meeting Vote: Massachusetts Specialized Opt-in Stretch Code

Overview

The Warwick Buildings and Energy Committee is recommending the adoption of the Massachusetts Specialized Opt-in Stretch Code, which will allow us to access the \$60 million that the state has set aside for Climate Leader Communities. The Massachusetts Specialized Opt-in Stretch Code, an optional but stricter energy efficiency code, would only impact new residential construction in Warwick. This is particularly relevant for Warwick because we typically see minimal new home construction but may experience an uptick in **Accessory Dwelling Units (ADUs)**.

Key Impacts for Warwick

Minimal Impact on Full-Scale New Construction

- The town averages only **one new build per year**, meaning direct impacts from the new regulations on single-family homes will be limited.
- The new code mandates Net Zero or All-Electric buildings, requiring higher energy efficiency and renewable energy integration.

Increased Focus on ADUs Instead of New Homes

- Given the rising trend of **Accessory Dwelling Units (ADUs)** in response to housing demand and affordability, homeowners may opt for **smaller, more flexible living spaces** rather than full-scale new construction.
- ADUs will be subject to HERS ratings, electrification requirements, and potential solar-ready provisions, but with slightly relaxed thresholds compared to full-size homes.

Opportunities

- Lower upfront costs for constructing new all-electric homes.
- More resilient housing stock with lower long-term energy costs.
- Potential for incentives at state and federal levels to offset increased building costs.
- Encouragement of ADUs as an alternative housing solution, easing housing shortages while promoting energyefficient living.

Potential Challenges Higher upfront costs if building with fossil fuel heating systems.

- Limited local enforcement capacity to ensure compliance with the new standards.
- Homeowner education and incentives will be critical to making the transition as smooth as possible.

Thanks to those of you who attended our district's budget hearing last week. We are proud of all we have accomplished this year and appreciate the town and school committee's support of our budget for 2025-2026. We aim to sustain all of our innovative programming while continuing to make improvements. Our teaching and learning goals are aligned to our budget proposal.

Given the shifting priorities of the new federal government and the potential cuts that have been discussed, we have been taking a conservative approach to planning our budget for fiscal year 2026 (FY26). We have had the following guiding principles as we have developed this budget:

- Identify creative areas to cut that maximize savings without impacting the student or family experience.
- Shift salaries where possible from grant funding to the district budget as grants are increasingly unpredictable, even ones that have long been reliable sources of funding for districts.
- Offer a 2.5% increase to returning educators in alignment with town increases and to ensure our staff have a living wage that allows them to support their families.







Coordinator Report April 2025 – David Young

The Town needs to consider ownership of the First Parish Meeting House - commonly referred to as "the white church," the one on the hill across from the Fire Station. The structure sits on the Town-owned Common and houses the Town Clock. The Town owns the land beneath the building; it does not own the building itself. We want to change that, because we are running into a wall seeking grants to support its preservation exactly because the Town is not the owner. The nonprofit body overseeing the affairs of the former church, the stewards of the building, want to transfer ownership of the structure to the Town, along with related assets to support preservation.

These assets include approximately \$100,000 in funds and a separate parcel of land: 34 acres located on Hastings Pond Road including Wawbeek Rock. The land continues to be taxed and is valued at \$135,000, but the title remains in the name of the Wheelock Estate, which was never probated. It is possible that this parcel could be subdivided into up to three building lots, creating potential revenue. The donors intend that both the funds and any proceeds from timber sales or lot sales be restricted, used solely for the preservation and upkeep of the Meeting House.

Though fundamentally sound, the building lacks running water and ADA-compliant facilities, and was historically served by privies. It remains a prominent architectural and cultural feature in Warwick's landscape, offering potential for adaptive reuse as a civic or cultural space.

Considering the building's uncertain future and potential value as a public asset, the capital planning workgroup that I am a part of has been exploring options for preservation and public use. One proposed path is for the Town to formally accept the gift, ensuring the structure's care and long-term viability. The Town is also seeking support from the Massachusetts Executive Office of Economic Development's One Stop for Growth program to evaluate feasibility, infrastructure needs, community-supported uses, and long-term financial sustainability.

Why now? We will end up with it anyway, and it is right to preserve it. The board of governance who can convey it is elderly has worked to be legally constituted to get us to this point. If we do nothing the Town will be the logical inheritor, but neglect could have undermined the structure by that time. Legal advice is being sought to clarify the process for accepting the building and assets, to understand but not resolve title issues related to the Wheelock Estate land, and to establish a mechanism for restricting the use of the funds and future proceeds in accordance with the donor's intent and applicable municipal regulations. Thanks to A. George Day for providing a lot of this context. You will be voting on this at the May 5 Annual Town Meeting.

You are invited to Tech Thursdays held weekly from 9:00 a.m. to noon at the Warwick Inn. These sessions provide assistance with technology-related questions, such as setting up devices or troubleshooting issues. In the future we are going to shorten the topical matter to about 20 minutes and start with that and then spend the rest of the time on the one-on-one. In addition to these regular sessions, we are planning to add another morning on digitizing photos to help preserve your memories. We hope to introduce monthly morning sessions focused on energy savings, offering guidance on reducing energy consumption, and making well-informed decisions.


