For years, a part of my job has been coordinating operations at the Transfer Station. It is gratifying to have the Commission step up and take charge of late. The place looks great, and we have become exemplary and no longer a teaching moment on how not to operate. Of note, our Transfer Station is open Wednesday evenings seasonally now through Labor Day.

When we place items in the recycling, it's easy to assume they all have similar value, but in fact the financial worth of recyclable materials varies significantly. Each type of material brings a different return on the secondary market; some have negative value, and this value can shift from month to month depending on markets. What follows is derived from recent data from our recycling activities. In terms of volume, sorted residential paper accounts for the largest portion of the recycling stream, making up just over 31 percent. At a market value of sixty dollars per ton, it contributes nearly nineteen dollars to the average revenue per ton collected. Cardboard follows closely in volume, representing 21 percent of the mix and fetching seventy-five dollars per ton, which yields nearly sixteen dollars in recovered value.

By comparison, aluminum cans make up less than one percent of the stream, yet they are among the most valuable commodities. At fourteen hundred dollars per ton, their contribution, about eleven and a half dollars per ton overall—comes from a very small fraction of the material we collect. While this per-ton contribution is lower than that of bulkier paper grades because of their smaller share in the mix, aluminum's dollar-for-dollar value remains second only to clear HDPE plastics. Those clear plastic containers, such as milk jugs, are currently priced at over two thousand dollars per ton and contribute nearly twenty-three dollars per ton despite being just over one percent of the stream.

Steel cans, PET bottles, and colored HDPE plastics all contribute more modestly, while mixed paper and certain types of lower-grade plastics offer only marginal returns. Glass and commingled plastics often reduce the overall value contributing negatively due to limited resale markets and additional handling costs. These market values I am describing do not reflect what the Town actually receives. The reported prices are gross market rates for clean, bailed, sorted materials picked up from processing facilities. Municipalities like ours don't receive these full amounts. Instead, we pay for the sorting and handling of our recyclables. That includes the labor, equipment, and overhead involved in separating the various materials into saleable categories. Those costs are deducted from the market value, and in many cases, they consume the bulk of any potential revenue.

Our town uses a dual-stream recycling system, which keeps paper separate from containers. This setup differs from the more common single-stream approach, where all recyclables are mixed together and sorted later at a regional facility. While dual-stream collection requires more effort at your home and at the transfer station it offers key benefits. Most importantly, we're able to compact our paper loads which significantly reduces transport costs. It also results in cleaner, less contaminated material, particularly paper, which commands better pricing and avoids the penalties that come with high residue rates in single-stream systems.

Contaminated and unusable material incur a disposal cost that reduces our total return. In the May 2025 report, residue lowered the average market value by over four dollars per ton. After accounting for all material types and this residue fee, the average market value for a ton of sorted recyclables stood at just under seventy-eight dollars. But once sorting and processing costs are factored in, the net value to the municipality is way lower.

In short, while bulk paper products and cardboard dominate in terms of volume and overall contribution, highvalue items like aluminum and natural HDPE are important due to their disproportionately high per-ton value. Their presence helps offset lower returns from other materials and underscores the importance of careful separation and clean recycling practices. Our dual-stream system enhances both material quality and cost efficiency, but market forces and processing expenses continue to limit what the town ultimately recovers in revenue.

Moore's Pond Beach Opens Memorial Day Weekend!

The Moore's Pond Beach water was tested for swimming on the week prior to Memorial Day. The beach was raked, winter debris cleaned up, beach permit acquired, and new barrier posts set. Our season is ready to begin! Bravo!

The beach committee will continue to have the water tested monthly and report any issues (no issues have occurred). Birds viewed at the beach have been: Eagle, Osprey, Common Merganser ducks, Mallard Ducks, and Canadian Geese. Do not touch or feed the wildlife, as bird flu is on the rise.

The water is clear, the beach is clean, picnic tables available, the view is incredible, parking is near, a path for wheelchairs and a wheelchair-accessible picnic table is available. You must carry out all you bring in, pets should be leashed, children monitored as there is no lifeguard, and there are no bathroom facilities.

Warwick Old Home Day Festivities by hosting a Beach Party on August 24 at 2:00PM. This

will close out the weekend festivities.

P.S. Clarifying the costs to heat the fire station last year: Chief Joe used numbers from checks written. I (Janice K) used the actual bills. Total electric use including lights, new heat pump, block heaters etc. was \$2,113 for 12 months, not \$8K. We are obliged to track the energy use of each building & all the equipment installed under prior grants. This project performed better than expected.


