LifePath Receives Alzheimer's Association Grant to Improve Respite Care for People Living with Dementia and Their Caregivers

Greenfield, July 1, 2025 — LifePath has been awarded \$125,000 from the Alzheimer's Association Center for Dementia Respite Innovation (CDRI) to enhance the quality and availability of dementia-specific respite care for people living with dementia and their caregivers in Franklin County and the North Quabbin area.

LifePath is one of 41 recipients chosen to receive grant funding from more than 200 applicants across the country. Funds will be used to enhance programming at the Community Engagement Center (CEC), a social day program designed to reduce social isolation and support individuals living with dementia, while offering respite, coaching, and planning support to caregivers. The CEC provides a vibrant, inclusive space where participants engage in social, cognitive, and creative activities co-designed to honor their voices, strengths, and lived experiences.

<u>David Young - Town Coordinator Report for August 2025</u>

Each Tuesday at noon, the Town Hall comes to life with the clatter of dishes, the hum of conversation, and the smell of a hot, home-cooked meal. It follows Tai Chi; Senior exercise session and I am not sure what else. Our weekly senior lunch is a wonderful thing happening in Warwick, and I want to invite you to come check it out.

This is not just about food. It is about community. It is about showing up, sharing a table, and being part of something together. While the meal is offered as a Council on Aging activity, it is open to all, especially anyone who could use a warm lunch and some company. We ask for \$5 to help cover our costs, but no one is turned away. We can do this because of a small army of volunteers, your generous contributions, and a bit of Yankee ingenuity.

This tradition has deep roots in Warwick. Years ago, hot congregate meals were served at the Town Hall after reheating under the umbrella of what is now known as LifePath. Back then, around 15 to 20 folks gathered weekly. That program ended for us when COVID struck, and for a while, the hall was quiet. But we brought the idea back, Phoenix-like, as part of our efforts to restart the elementary school and use the school kitchen ahead of Warwick's restart as a public school.

Some of you will remember that Pioneer carried debt from unpaid school meals, and that burden was part of the argument to close Warwick Community School. As part of our insurgency, we decided to evaluate running our own kitchen again, we brought in professional chef Gail Beauregard. Initially using American Rescue Plan grant funds, and later a grant secured through a COA source, we have been able to relaunch the Tuesday meal on our own terms. We serve family style and cook the food on site.

At first on our restart, meals were prepared at the school; but when we got our wish and school resumed, outside access was restricted, so that was not sustainable. We paid our share of costs to the district, then shifted to cooking directly on-site at the Town Hall. These days, four of us—Howard Matheson, Laurette Crane, Clyde Perkins Jr., and myself—start cooking each Tuesday at 9 a.m. Clare Green, our trained ServSafe food safety lead, keeps us compliant and safe. We also hire help to handle dishwashing, because we aren't professional chefs and try not to clean too and stay focused on the food which is pretty good.

We're grateful for the support we've received from our regional health inspector, Jason, and others who've helped us to evolve. We now have a healthy \$5,000 buffer in the revolving fund that keeps the lunch going. That fund lives under the care of the Council on Aging, and it is what allows us to keep offering the meals whether people pay or not.

So consider this your personal invitation. Whether you are a senior, a neighbor in need, or just someone who would enjoy tasty food and better company, come join us. Tuesdays at noon, Town Hall. No reservations required. Just bring your appetite and a little time to sit and connect.

NEW! Peabody Essex Museum pass: The PEM (<u>pem.org</u>) is a world-class art museum located in Salem, Mass. The Museum's roots date to the 1799 founding of the East India Marine Society, an organization of Salem ship captains who had sailed near or beyond either the Cape of Good Hope or Cape Horn. The society's bylaws included a provision for the establishment of a cabinet of "natural and artificial curiosities." The Museum pass provides for discounted admission.


NEW!: Salem Witch Museum pass: To make the trip east to Salem even more worthwhile, the Library now also offers FREE passes to the 1692 Salem Witch Museum (<u>salemwitchmuseum.com</u>). The Museum examines one of the most enduring and emotional events in American history, the Salem witch trials of 1692; as well as the earlier European history that preceded and led to it. (**Note**: not for use from Oct.-Nov.)

Mobile MakerSpace workshop (#8) - Leather Tooling: Saturday, Aug. 16th @ 1 pm - for all ages (Under 10 with caregiver): Leather worker Melissa Mallet will lead patrons in a leather tooling project using scrap leather pieces. Leather tooling is the art of stamping, carving and embossing pliable leather with unique design. We'll recycle scraps from custom projects and turn them into key fobs, bookmarks or even earrings! Space is limited—please register in advance. Program will run approx. 90 minutes.

Non-Fiction Discussion Group - Thursday, August 21st @ 7 pm: This discussion group is wide open: Could be something you're reading now or from long ago; science, history, memoirs, biographies; articles, books, newsletters, journals. It's all up for discussion at the new non-fiction discussion group. Designed for independent, asynchronous reading, we'll get together to share our favorite non-fiction reads and make recommendations. Monthly Short Story Hour - Ernest Hemingway, Thursday, August 28th @ 7:30 pm. We'll read selections from *The Complete Short Stories of Ernest Hemingway*. In addition to being one of the world's most successful novelists and influential prose stylists, Hemingway was an acknowledged master of the short story—most of which were included in *The First Forty-Nine*, published in 1938. Come to read or just to listen.

"Bizarre Facts From the Timeline of Human History:" Abraham Lincoln could have sent a fax to a Japanese samurai! That's right, the fax machine was invented in 1843, the samurai ceased to exist in 1867 and Lincoln died in 1865. Scottish inventor Alexander Bain patented an 'electric printing telegraph', although it was not until 1865 (the year of Lincoln's death) that the first telefax service, between Paris and Lyon, was established. So it would've been tight, but it could have happened.

HOT WEATHER SAFETY TIPS FOR YOUR PETS

- 2) Know the symptoms of an overheated pet

- 4) Pay special attn to breeds with "flat faces" such as pugs/Persians


