<u>David Young - Town Coordinator Report for September 2025</u>

We are just stepping into the third year of Warwick running our own municipal school district, and I am sharing perspectives from the municipal side. Our elementary school has been holding steady with about 30 Warwick kids, while our older kids, another 30 or so head off to Pioneer, the tech school, or charters. This year something new is happening. For the first time, we can take school choice students from outside Warwick into our elementary school. We would not do this if it meant adding space or staff, but we have a building built for a couple of hundred children, classrooms that are ready, and a faculty and school committee that thought it through carefully. We expect to admit about 15 Massachusetts school choice students, by lottery.

Our preschool program is another bright spot. The unofficial word is that fourteen pre-kindergarten children are enrolled. That may not sound like a lot to folks in bigger towns, but here it feels like a small miracle and is clearly meeting a need.

Some of you may remember that school choice was born out of state education reforms in the 1990s. The idea was to give families the right to move their children to schools they felt were doing better, with the money following the students. Back then, \$5,000 matched the cost of educating a child. Today, that figure is more like a quarter of what it costs. The state told us that if Warwick took elementary school students, we would have to pay the full \$20,000 per pupil tuition to a high school if a kid stayed with its class since we do not offer junior or senior high. The Warwick School Committee worked out a tuition agreement with Mahar so that choice-in students to our school can stay with their classmates without bankrupting our town. It also means that children from other towns can now come here under school choice without Warwick footing that full bill. I note the SC already worked out that we are allowed to take out-of-state tuition students, but we were hogtied on taking in state kids. Now we can admit choice-in students and our kids now have the option of Pioneer or Mahar for junior and senior high school.

To make all this possible, we have gotten grants and built up local support. The New Schools Venture Fund gave us major help as we planned our launch and kept us going in the first years. Closer to home, we now have our Warwick Education Foundation. This not-for-profit can legally raise money for the school in ways the town itself cannot and offers tax deductibility. It is not easy for government to ask for contributions without raising eyebrows, so the foundation provides the right channel. I will just say that it is worth keeping in mind when you think about your will, present or future giving, and beneficiaries.

Finally, there is a bigger regional question on the horizon. After years of study, the six-town planning board (I have served on it for the past six years) has recommended that Warwick's municipal School District, Pioneer Valley Regional, and Gill Montague, merge into a six-town regional district called Great River. That proposal is heading toward town meetings' consideration in the fall, in late November. Between now and then, we will have plenty of discussions here in Warwick to weigh what that might mean for us and what is best for Warwick.

So, there is a lot happening in Warwick education. From preschoolers getting their start, to new families choosing our school, another option for junior and senior high, and to long-term decisions about regional partnerships, we are right in the thick of it. Stay tuned.









The Motivation

- The school-aged population in Franklin County has been declining since the end of the 1990s
- Both Gill-Montague and Pioneer Valley districts have struggled during population decline because state funding is heavily dependent on population increase
- Population and budget constraints make it harder to offer electives, sports, and AP classes

The Plan for a Combined District: Great River Regional School District

- The Pioneer building would become a middle school for all students in the district
- The Turners Falls building would become a high school for all students in the district
- With larger numbers, the district could provide more robust academic and enrichment opportunities at the middle and high school



Combining Districts to Benefit Students

Faced with the challenges of a declining school-aged population, the towns of Bernardston, Gill, Leyden, Montague, Northfield, and Warwick sought to create a sustainable educational future for their students with robust offerings. The six towns created a regional planning board in 2019 to study a potential merging of the Gill-Montague and Pioneer Valley regional districts to explore a new, six-town regional school district.

Over the past six years, the Planning Board has worked to examine the challenges and benefits of combining these two districts. The Planning Board engaged expert consultants in studying various dimensions of such a merger. The Planning Board sought the perceptions and perspectives of the students, parents, school district staff, community members, elected officials, and business partners in these communities.

In January 2024, the Planning Board overwhelmingly recommended moving forward with the drafting of a regionalization agreement.

The proposed six town regional agreement, written in collaboration by members of each town, will be voted on at each Town Meeting to be held sometime in November. Visit the website to stay up to date.

Tuesday, September 9th @ 7 pm - Poetry/Book reading with BG Thurston:

Join poet BG Thurston of Warwick as she reads from her new collection, titled *The Many Lives of Cathouse Farm - Tales of a Rural Brothel.* "A finely-crafted collection of poems giving voice to a 255-year-old farmhouse and its surprising history—and to the people and animals who have lived there since before the American Revolution..." (David Thoreen, Assumption University)

Tuesday, September 16th @ 7 pm - King Philip's War - Great Falls/Turners Falls:

David Brule will present his program entitled 'King Philip's War In Your Backyard—From Sokwakik to Peskeompskut.' This program will detail events that occurred in the middle Connecticut River Valley in 1675-76. Metacomet, called King Philip by the English, led a coalition of Nipmuc/k, Wampanoag, Abenaki and Narragansett during this little-known but significant revolt against English colonizing forces. Brule, project coordinator of the National Park Service grant for the American Battlefield Protection Program at the Great Falls/Turners Falls site, will also share the latest archaeological findings on the massacre of Indigenous noncombatants on May 19, 1676 at Peskeompskut, as well as the counter-attack by Native forces on that day.

Non-Fiction Discussion Group - Thursday, September 18th @ 7 pm: This discussion group is wide open: Could be something you're reading now or from long ago; science, history, memoirs, biographies; articles, books, newsletters, journals. It's all up for discussion at the new non-fiction discussion group. Designed for independent, asynchronous reading, we'll get together to share our favorite non-fiction reads and make recommendations. Come to share/discuss or just to listen and build your reading list.

Mobile MakerSpace workshop (#9) - Glass Fusing: Saturday, Sept. 20th @ 1 pm - for ages 16+: Students will learn the basics of glass fusing including glass cutting, sanding, and designing of 2-dimensional pieces. We'll have fun experimenting with different shapes, textures, and mediums of glass to inspire our creation! They had just come from Erving and were on their way to Montague. I was relieved to actually find a stamp with the Library's name on it—and an ink pad with some juice left, phew!

It came with a letter noting that 'Grandma won't be able to pay for it anymore.' The book is 'Your Child, His Family, and Friends,' by marriage and family counselor Frances Bruce Strain." The Green Corner

Utility discount on Electricity coming soon!

It's not often we get to say that electricity rates will be going down. Starting November 1st, all three major electric utilities in Massachusetts - Unitil, National Grid, and Eversource - will offer new lower winter electricity delivery rates for heat pump users (delivery rates cover maintenance of the electricity system and can comprise a significant portion of your bill). National Grid's discount will be - \$0.0415 / kWh.

This means that customers using heat pumps (mini-splits are the most common example) can expect to save around \$540 on their heating bills this winter compared to what they paid in past winters — a roughly 17% discount. This is a game changer for clean heating in Massachusetts!

The lower rates will be in effect from November through April and will apply to all of the electricity usage in a household with a heat pump. This is good news for those who also have EVs, heat pump hot water heaters, electric dryers, and electric stoves, although having purchased one of these does not qualify the user for the discount. The discount is for heat pump users only.

Note: The heat pump rates will not be affected by your choice of electricity supplier, and participating in a Community Choice Electricity aggregation will not disqualify anyone from getting the heat pump discount.

Important Note: If you received a heat pump rebate through Mass Save, you should be automatically enrolled in the new rate, but you should call your utility provider to confirm. If you did not receive a Mass Save rebate for your heat pump, you'll need to call your utility and ask to be enrolled. Please note that it might take a while for the utilities to train customer service staff. You might have to call back in a month.

Unfortunately, this discount will not apply to our town buildings or other commercial accounts (for now).

ANNUAL HOUSEHOLD HAZARDOUS WASTE COLLECTION DAY

Franklin County Solid Waste District will hold the 2025 household hazardous waste collection on Saturday, September 20, at Greenfield Community College (GCC) and the Orange Transfer Station.

Residents and businesses must register by September 10th. Online registration for the 2025 collection will open on August 13 at <u>franklincountywastedistrict.org</u>. Mail-in registration forms will be available in mid-August at town transfer stations, town offices, and in local newspapers.

Participants will be assigned an appointment time to bring waste to the collection; an appointment time and instructions will be provided by mail after registration is processed.

The collection is free for residents of most of the District's 21 member towns. Businesses may participate but must pay for disposal costs. For business registration information, call (413) 772-2438.

This event provides an opportunity to dispose of hazardous items that should not be put in the trash, such as leftover oil-based paints, stains, paint thinners, pesticides, herbicides, pool chemicals, motor oil, antifreeze, household cleaners, and other household chemicals. A more complete list of acceptable items is at franklincountywastedistrict.org.

Batteries and mercury-containing items such as fluorescent light bulbs, thermometers, and thermostats are not accepted at this collection but should never be put in trash or recycling. Handle them carefully, bring them to a municipal transfer station or a Regional Hazardous Waste "Super Site" and hand to the attendant. In addition, batteries are accepted at Staples stores, and fluorescent light bulbs are accepted at Lowe's Stores (all types of fluorescents), and Home Depot (CFLs only).

SAVE THE DATE: FALL "CLEAN SWEEP" BULKY WASTE RECYCLING DAY

The three collection locations on Saturday, October 18 (9 a.m. to noon) will be Erving Highway Garage on Public Works Boulevard (off Rt. 2); Mohawk Trail Regional School at 26 Ashfield Rd. (Route 112 South), Buckland; and Whately Transfer Station at 73 Christian Lane in Whately.

Residents and businesses from any of the District's 21 member towns may bring bulky items to this collection. There are charges for most items (cash only). A price list for the most common items is at: franklincountywastedistrict.org. Pre-registration is not required for Bulky Waste Day.

Acceptable items include tires, appliances, refrigerators, scrap metal, furniture, carpeting, construction debris, computers, televisions, propane gas tanks, textiles, books, bulky rigid plastics for recycling, and other large items. Materials will be recycled whenever possible.

From the Warwick Community School and District

Dear Warwick Community,

We are excited to be launching the 2025–2026 school year and want to share updates on our growing enrollment and staff professional learning.

Enrollment Growth

This fall, 50 students are enrolled at Warwick Community School in junior kindergarten—sixth grade—an 85% increase over last year! This growth reflects families' confidence in our focus on high academic expectations and nature-centered, place- and project-based learning. While we continue our primary tuition agreement with Pioneer Valley, our new agreement with the Mahar Regional School District makes it possible for students from surrounding towns to "choice in" to WCS and then continue to Mahar for middle and high school. This agreement allows us to send non-resident choice students to Mahar for the choice rate of \$5,000 rather than the full tuition rate we pay for Warwick resident students. Warwick resident students may also attend Mahar, whose robust academics, sports, clubs, and enrichment programs provide strong opportunities beyond sixth grade. We observed classrooms at Mahar last spring and were inspired by rigorous, engaging instruction across subject areas. We thank the Warwick School Committee for their tireless work in securing this agreement and will also continue to monitor two pieces of legislation we have put forward to adjust school choice law for Warwick and other small rural districts, keeping you updated on progress.

Professional Learning

As lifelong learners, our faculty dedicated the 10 days before school to collaboration and growth. With expanding classes, we are focusing on strategies that foster meaningful student-to-student collaboration so all children learn at high levels. This year's learning centers on the research of Dr. Peter Liljedahl, whose "thinking classroom" practices help students engage deeply with problems and shift from dependent to independent learners. His approach builds on last year's work with The Brain, continuing our efforts to move the deepest cognitive work to students. These practices will be embedded in our math classrooms using the Illustrative Mathematics curriculum. We look forward to sharing more with you throughout the year.


