Cemetery Walks

Jim Toth will lead two cemetery walks in November. The walks will be to the Kelton-Moses Cemetery on Monday, November 11, 2025, and to the Kilton Cemetery on Tuesday, November 12, 2025. Both walks will start by meeting at the Warwick Town Hall at 11 AM. From there we will drive to the trailheads. Both cemeteries are in the remote north-east corner of town and have no direct road access. The Kelton-Moses Cemetery is about a 1 mile hike from the trailhead and the Kilton Cemetery is about a ½ mile hike from the trailhead.

The Kelton-Moses Cemetery has 10 graves with engraved headstones as well as about 20 graves with un-engraved headstones. The Kilton Cemetery has five graves. Each cemetery has one Revolutionary War Veteran.

Both hikes are moderate in difficulty and good footwear is recommended. Hopefully a few of us will be willing to do some raking and light brush cutting, so work gloves would be useful, as well. Introducing the new Residential Heat Pump Rate

Starting November 1, 2025, a new reduced electric delivery rate will be available for qualified residential customers who use heat pumps for home heating. This seasonal rate applies to electricity usage from November 1 through April 30, helping reduce energy costs during colder months.

Who is qualified for the new Heat Pump Rate?

The Heat Pump Rate will be available to residential electric customers who use a heat pump to heat their home, either fully or partially. Please note that heat pump systems used only for air conditioning or water heating do not qualify.

How do I enroll in the new Heat Pump Rate?

If your Heat Pump was installed in your home with the support of a Mass Save® program in 2019 or later, and you're on a residential electric rate, you may be **automatically enrolled** in this reduced rate. If you are eligible, you will see this new rate on your bill starting in November 2025—**no action is needed** on your part. NGrid will send you a notification to confirm your enrollment by the end of October.

If you don't receive an auto-enrollment confirmation and believe you should qualify, you can sign up. Check this website for updated information as it becomes available: <https://www.nationalgridus.com/MA-Home/Rates/Heat-Pump-Rate>

If your Heat Pump was installed WITHOUT using a Mass Save® program or you're unsure about how the heat pump was installed, you may still qualify for the Heat Pump Rate. **Instructions** for enrollment will be provided when the application process opens.

Where can I see the Heat Pump Rate on my electric bill?

If you're enrolled in the Heat Pump Rate, you'll find this message reflected on your bill: *You are currently enrolled in the Heat Pump Rate, which provides a lower distribution charge during the winter heating season. The reduced rate is applied to November through April kWh usage and is included in the distribution charge line item under the Delivery Services section of your bill.*

When will I see the Heat Pump Rate on my electric bill?

It could take one to two billing cycles after the new rate takes effect on November 1 for the discount rate to appear on your bill.

Opinion on The Six-Town Proposal

Warwick's School Committee does not support joining the proposed six-town regional "super" district

At its October 8th meeting, the Warwick School District Committee voted 4 to 1 against supporting the proposed six-town regionalization plan agreement, slated for a Warwick Special Town Meeting discussion and vote on the evening of Tuesday, November 18th. **[THIS MEETING HAS SINCE BEEN POSTPONED]**

The majority of School Committee members see no advantage, financial or otherwise, in joining the proposed K - 12 school district. Rather, we believe that joining the larger district would put much of what makes Warwick Community School (WCS) successful at risk, including the unfortunate possibility that our school could be closed again against our wishes.

Our concerns with the six-town regional agreement:

- 1) WCS's unique curriculum that connects students to community and nature, and was chosen for our students' needs would not be protected from change, given the pressure in a regional district to align the curriculum of all schools.
- 2) We would lose autonomy in decision-making and fundraising. We would no longer have our own Superintendent or School Committee. Rather, we would have one representative on a committee of 13 members, where it would be difficult to advocate for Warwick's needs when they do not align with those of other towns.
- 3) Warwick high school students would have a longer bus ride (58 minutes) to Turners Falls High School, which impacts student wellness as well as their ability to participate in school events, extracurricular activities, and connecting with peers from school.

Our reasons for confidence in our own school district:

- 1) Warwick currently has tuition agreements with Pioneer Valley Regional School (PVRs) and Mahar Regional School for students in grades 7 through 12, giving older students options that also include Franklin County Technical School and Four Rivers Charter Public School.
- 2) Since 2023 WCS has received over a half-million dollars in grant funding due to the hard work of our Superintendent and staff, and that money was put back into improving our school.
- 3) WCS's enrollment grew from 27 last school year to 48 from increased interest locally, our JK/K program, and our hard-won ability to accept school choice students. Interest in our school continues to grow and attract students, teachers, and families to Warwick.

There is interest among school committee members in exploring joining a secondary regional school district in the future, while keeping our own district for elementary school; however, this current six-town agreement is not the right one for our community.

Opinion on The Six-Town Proposal

The Six-Town Proposal seeks to incorporate the current school districts of Warwick, Gill-Montague and Pioneer into a new district. While I will do everything in my power to support the new district if it comes to pass, I am speaking today as the educational leader for Warwick and I do not believe this proposal is in the best interest of Warwick students or citizens. While there are many reasons I believe this to be true, here are the five most critical ones.

1. Curriculum & Faculty - Although the Warwick Community Elementary School (WCS) has only been open for three years, we have already won grants and awards for our innovative, evidence-based curriculum. While we would like to believe that WCS would be given the ability to continue to sustain and build on this model, the truth is that most districts expect their elementary schools to follow the same curriculum. Coherence is a natural priority in larger districts. We also know that, while our school is rural and remote, we have been able to attract and retain extremely talented teachers and staff because of our collaborative, innovative model. We would also not have control over our staffing and some of the extraordinary teachers we have hired and cultivated may be transferred to other schools across the district.

2. Transportation - The Six-Town Proposal has our secondary students being picked up at 6:17 a.m. for a 58 minute ride and a 7:15 a.m. school start time. This extraordinarily early and long route is not good for students' health or well-being.

3. Loss of Agency - The new Six-Town Proposal has had limited involvement of Warwick parents, students, teachers, school committee members or leadership team members in its development - the very people who have made WCS a success. While having our own superintendent and school committee may seem like a lot of oversight for a tiny district, it has allowed us to grow and blossom with a great deal of support. In the new Six-Town Regional Plan, there would be a 13 member school committee and only one of those members would be from Warwick. Our students, families and citizens would not have sufficient voice in developing and leading the new district.

4. Funding - One of the inspirations for this proposal is to make us more sustainable financially. While we are always at risk of having an unexpected large expense, we have shown ourselves to be extremely good at careful budgeting and raising funds for unexpected expenses. We now have a sister foundation, The Warwick Community School Foundation. Since our opening in 2023, we have raised more than a half a million dollars in grant funds, allowing us to meet any challenges and to be innovative. If we become part of a larger district, we will also be charged with funding the extraordinary expenses of the other 5 towns and we will likely not be able to fundraise specifically for Warwick.

5. Opportunities - The Six-Town Proposal has come about is to offer students more peers and more rigorous learning opportunities. I support this goal which is one of the reasons why we developed an additional tuition agreement last summer with Mahar, which offers many more classes and extracurricular opportunities. Warwick middle and high school students already have the option of a bigger and more rigorous secondary experience.

For all of these reasons, I recommend Warwick citizens vote against the new Six-Town proposal in November at the Town Meeting. Please feel free to reach out to me with any questions you may have.

Town Coordinator Report for November 2025—David Young

The Select Board is seeking applicants to serve on the Zoning Board of Appeals (ZBA). This is the local adjudicatory body empowered to grant, within the limits of our zoning bylaws, variances and special permits. The ZBA has five members: three regular and two alternates, and we currently have three openings—one regular seat and two alternates. We already have three people interested and would like to see additional applicants.

We are also in need of a Town Secretary to take meeting minutes. This work can be done remotely or from a recording, making it a flexible way to serve the community.

For both positions, those interested should send a short bio or statement in support of their candidacy.

The planned fall Special Town Meeting to consider joining a larger regional school district has been postponed until spring at the request of a state agency. Since then, the Planning Board has learned that it may be possible to advance more than one version of a district agreement, and I remain hopeful that one might leave Warwick out.

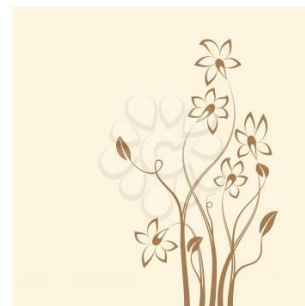

When: *Third Sunday of the month: November 16 at 1 p.m.*

Where to meet: *At the parking lot of the old prison camp on Richmond Road, about 1.1 miles north of the four-way intersection of Richmond, Athol, and Hastings Heights Roads.*

The Hike: *Richards Reservoir is a gem in northeastern Warwick with just what you would expect: a dam, a pond, and a wetland. Our hike (approximately 2.4 miles) will take us around the reservoir, sometimes on parts of the New England Trail. Be prepared for some possible wet sections and please bring a water bottle. We will have maps and a trail description available.*

The all-volunteer Warwick Trails Group maintains some of Warwick's town owned trails, hikes and maps existing trails, plans and creates new ones, and occasionally leads hikes around Warwick.

New Early Childhood Playground - Community Co-Design Process Begins This Week!

In collaboration with the Warwick Select Board, the Warwick School District and the Warwick Community School Foundation are embarking on a multi-year process to reimagine, design and build a new early childhood playground for preschool, kindergarten, first and second graders in the town and at WCS. As a starting place, we have developed these design principles. We will create a new early childhood playground that is:

- ACCESSIBLE - All of our students will be able to enjoy all aspects of the playground.
- NATURE-CENTERED - The playground will fit naturally and organically into the current space and build upon our beautiful woodland campus.
- GREEN - The construction materials will be safe and support our goal to be a school, district and town that is as green and sustainable as possible.
- JOYFUL - Like everything we do at WCS, we aim to provide students with joyful learning and play experiences.

By the time you receive this Newsletter, we will have visited the Hitchcock Center’s [Colleen Kelley Discovery Playard](#) (845 West Street, Amherst) and the nearby playground at the [Hampshire College Early Learning Center](#) (893 West Street, Amherst). Former Education Director of the Hitchcock Center and Warwick Community School Foundation Board Member, Colleen Kelly, will have lead us in playing and touring these playgrounds. We will have taken photographs of the elements of the playgrounds and asked children, caretakers and community members to weigh in on their favorites. 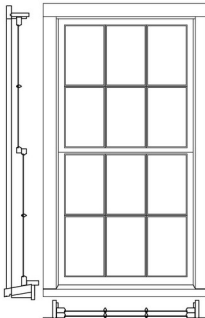
