Help Wanted - Green Corner

The Buildings and Energy Committee is beginning a discussion about how Warwick will meet its growing need for coordinated management of town-owned buildings in the future, including maintenance, planning, overseeing capital improvements, and energy efficiency work. This month the Town will apply for Climate Leader designation under the Green Communities program. Access to substantial state funding for weatherization, electrification, and other energy betterment projects will become available. Warwick will need sustainable project management capacity to take full advantage of the program.

There are several approaches under consideration. One longer-term option is to work with the Franklin Regional Council of Governments to develop a shared project manager who would serve several towns with a sharing arrangement. Paying for this needed capacity is the challenge. We could identify, capture and dedicate the savings achieved from our own energy improvements in the budget process. Larger municipalities have generated millions of dollars in savings by lowering fuel use, tightening buildings, and installing modern equipment, and then formally reallocating a portion of those savings at budget time. The idea is to remove the dollars associated with the savings from the department that realizes them and instead appropriate that money to support the staffing needed to keep the work moving. A percentage of verified savings could help finance a part-time professionalized position.

In addition to project management, Warwick needs better grant writing and resource development capacity. There is still considerable federal and state funding on the table, but our ability to capture it depends on having someone ready to pursue, manage, and report on these opportunities. To date, the Town has relied on the generosity and stamina of our aging Building and Energy Committee and whatever time the Town Coordinator can spare. The Committee's goal is to start a larger conversation about how to build a sustainable, long-term structure that supports our buildings, reduces energy consumption and emissions, and ensures Warwick can fully benefit from the funding available in the years ahead.

This conversation is also happening at a moment of transition for Warwick. Our long-time Town Coordinator is stepping back and preparing for retirement, and with that change comes the need to rethink how we organize and sustain the day-to-day responsibilities including of managing town buildings and energy projects. At the same time, becoming Climate Leader Community will bring significant benefits to Warwick and will also carry real transactional and administrative obligations. These programs offer substantial grant funding, technical assistance, and long-term savings, yet they also require diligent project oversight, reporting, and coordination with state agencies. This added workload makes it even more important that we identify people who can help the Town navigate these opportunities.

We are therefore looking for residents who have the skills and temperament to serve in this capacity. The Town needs someone who is organized, comfortable tracking projects from start to finish, and able to communicate effectively with contractors, engineers, and state officials. Experience with building systems, construction, budgeting, or energy efficiency is helpful, but reliability, curiosity, and follow-through matter just as much. The role involves identifying funding sources, helping departments plan and sequence work, and ensuring that the benefits of energy upgrades are fully realized. Even a modest, steady commitment from a capable resident could make a meaningful difference during this transition.

Warwick has a deep well of talent, practical experience, and civic dedication. If you have skills in project management, facilities work, energy systems, or administration, or if you simply have the ability to organize complex tasks and keep them moving, we hope you will consider stepping forward. This is an opportunity to help guide Warwick through an important period of change, capture the benefits of state energy programs, and strengthen the Town's ability to plan for the future. Memories of the Past

The Dumb Bell Club

In 1891, a group of Warwick's young people joined together to form The Dumb Bell Club. We do not know much about this organization. All we have is a photograph, the names of the club members, a program, two wooden dumb bells and newspaper clippings. But let's image these young people-imagine them performing a drill of synchronized exercises each using two one pound wood Spaulding dumb bells. The class performed the drill as well as a short drama in Warwick. It was so successful; they were invited to perform the drill in Orange where a supper was held and the photograph taken.

What was happening locally and in the country to make such a club unsurprising? By the turn of the nine-teenth century life in our town was changing. The railroad had not gone through Warwick, as had been hoped, but through Athol instead. Industries moved closer to transportation and people moved with them. The population of Warwick had dropped from 1,021 in 1850 to 565 in 1890. Residents of small towns had always been thrown on their own resources for entertainment and smaller population meant this was even truer.

Things were also changing in the larger world. The Industrial Revolution necessitated cheap labor and immigration was coming not only from German states and Ireland but increasingly from southern and eastern Europe; the population was becoming more urban. 1% of the population received more income than the poorest 50%; the U.S. government officially closed the Western frontier.

Perhaps it was the emergence of a new middle class with more free time, or a concern for public health (exacerbated by the living conditions endured by newly arrived immigrants), but an interest in health through exercise began to take center stage and health came to be viewed as a personal responsibility. There was growing interest in nutrition, in calisthenics, outdoor activities and competitive sports. In many states legislation was passed mandating compulsory public school physical education. Sargent College (now part of Boston University) was offering a certificate in physical education; and physical education began to be thought of as a profession.

Warwick instituted its Dumb Bell Club in 1891, the year which James Naismith, PE instructor at the YMCA Training College (now Springfield College) invented the game of basketball. Did these young people form their club to improve their health, or were they simply following the spirit of their times? BY F. Fellows

Warwick Energy Program:

New Supplier and Lower Rates Beginning January 2026

Warwick has signed a new thirty-four-month electricity supply contract with **First Point Power** for the Community Choice Power Supply Program. Postcards will be going out soon to those customers who are already automatically enrolled. The program will continue to offer **three product options**, but the content of two options has changed.

New Rates and Options (Starting January 2026 Meter Reads)

Standard Option – 13.045¢/kWh

100 percent renewable, including 31 percent National Wind RECs.

Optional Green 100 - 15.452¢/kWh

100 percent Massachusetts Class I renewable energy.

Optional Green - 14.068¢/kWh

Includes 31 percent Massachusetts Class I RECs above the state minimum.

These replace the current offerings, which expire with December 2025 meter reads.

What This Means for Warwick Residents

Most Warwick households and small businesses are enrolled in the **standard product**. The rate will drop from **15.136¢/kWh** to **13.045¢/kWh** in January. For a home using 600 kWh per month, this is a **savings of about \$13 per month** on the supply portion of the bill.

The new standard rate is also **lower than National Grid's Residential Basic Service rate** of 15.484¢/kWh, meaning residents can expect to save **around \$15 in January** compared to Basic Service. National Grid's next Basic Service rates will be announced in late December and take effect February 1, 2026.

Background and Long-Term Savings

Warwick launched its aggregation program in August 2020 to provide price stability, competitive rates, and increased renewable energy. From the start of the program through June 2025, Warwick ratepayers have saved **over \$421,000** compared to National Grid Basic Service.

No Action Required

If you are currently enrolled in the Warwick program, your account will automatically roll over to the new rate and supplier. You will see **First Point Power** listed under "Supply Services" on your February 2026 National Grid bill.

Renewable energy content will shift slightly depending on the option you are in, but you **do not need to take any steps** unless you want to switch options, opt-in, or opt-out.

A Few Important Notes

- The Warwick program charges no enrollment or exit fees.
- If you are under contract with a third-party electricity supplier, check whether they charge early termination fees before switching.
- National Grid Basic Service rates change twice each year and may sometimes be higher or lower than Warwick's rate. The program aims for **long-term** savings, but future savings cannot be guaranteed.
