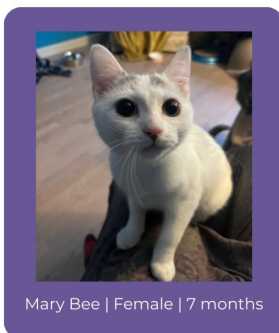
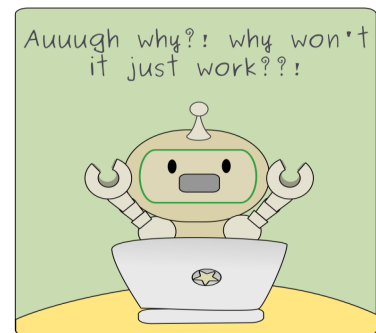

Planning Board News

The Planning Board is proposing yet another round of changes to our Accessory Dwelling Unit (ADU, also known as mother-in-law apartment) bylaw. These changes were prompted by changes in state regulations made after our last bylaw change, which was prompted by a change in state law. Our proposed changes for Annual Town Meeting in May include allowing ADUs by-right on nonconforming (grandfathered) lots, as required by state regulations; changing the acreage requirement for a second ADU (which requires a Special Permit); and rewriting the ADU provisions for the sake of clarity without other changes in substance.

We will hold an informal Public Information Session to explain and discuss these proposed changes and seek feedback from the community on Thursday, February 12 at 7:30 pm in the basement of Town Hall. Expect cookies.

Green Corner: Warwick Fire Station PV Array and a Cleaner Future

Heading North on Rte. 78, it is hard to miss seeing the new photo-voltaic (PV array) on the Fire Station. Kudos to the volunteer firemen who agreed back in 2015 to face the roof south so that future solar panels could be mounted there.

At Special Town Meeting in December 2024, townspeople voted to pay for this out of "free cash." Estimated payback at the time was just under seven years (not including the 30% federal rebate!), so it made financial sense, especially given that the Fire Station was soon to be heated by heat pumps. Even though the new addition will more than double the energy use in that building, the array is estimated to produce **FOUR** times the electricity consumed there. Significant credits will accrue on that bill and can be transferred to other Town accounts.

The recently-submitted Climate Leader application, if accepted, will give Warwick access to up to \$1,000,000 in grant funding towards more PV systems on other suitable Town-owned roofs. It could also fund community-wide programs such as winsert-making workshops or an "ask a house doctor" program.

The Buildings and Energy Committee welcomes all ideas for grant-funded projects, and even future Green Corners. We do not have a monopoly on a vision for a greener, cleaner future for the town. Please reach out and even consider becoming a member. All are welcome!

LIBRARY NEWS - FEBRUARY

***NEW* addition to the Library of Things - Blood Pressure cuffs:** With the support of the American Heart Association, the Library now has several blood pressure cuff kits to loan out to patrons as part of the Libraries with Heart initiative. The kits are easy-to-use and available on a first come, first-serve basis, for a period of two weeks at a time (or longer if there is no waiting list). Batteries are included, along with an instruction sheet. **Medical Disclaimer:** Patron/borrower understands that any concerns about their health should be addressed to a healthcare provider.

***NEW* addition to the Library of Things - "Walkie-talkies":** A pair of perfectly good "like-new" Eodon walkie-talkies was recently found in storage at the Library. They have been tested and are ready for use. A walkie-talkie is a portable, handheld two-way radio that allows for instant, short-range wireless communication, operating on shared radio frequencies by pressing a "push-to-talk" (PTT) button to speak and releasing it to listen, meaning only one person can talk at a time. Battery-powered, batteries included. Instructions also included.

***NEW* "Humanism" discussion group starting up - 2nd Tuesdays, Feb 10th @ 7 pm:** Humanism is a value-system that prefers human beings - their political rights and cultural creations - to anything else in the universe. It arose in the cosmopolitan and tolerant climate of ancient Rome in the writings of Cicero. Humanism was swept aside for a thousand years during the rise of Christianity before being revived by Petrarch's rediscovery of Cicero as the main catalyst for the Renaissance. Ever since, Humanism has been a source of tolerance and liberalism in the modern Western world, including the secular framework of the United States. We aim to trace this movement from its Ciceronian fountainhead to the Founding Fathers and beyond. Discussion will be facilitated by Jesse Lopes of Warwick, who teaches Philosophy at Boston College. Readings may be suggested but are not required.

Non-Fiction Discussion Group - Thursday, Feb. 19th @ 7 pm: This discussion group is wide open: Could be something you're reading now or from long ago; science, history, memoirs, biographies; articles, books, newsletters, journals. It's all up for discussion at the new non-fiction discussion group. Designed for independent, asynchronous reading, we'll get together to share our favorite non-fiction reads and make recommendations. Come to share/discuss or just to listen and build your reading list.

***NEW* Teen Pizza Hangout - Monday, Feb. 23rd, 4-5 pm (Library closed to public):** Here's a chance for local teens to hang out at the Library by themselves—and eat free pizza! The Library closes at 4 pm, so the teens will have the place to themselves, except for the Librarian, who will keep a respectful distance. If this event proves popular, it can be done monthly—it's up to the teens.

Monthly Short Story Hour - Jhumpa Lahiri, Thursday, Feb. 26th @ 7:30 pm: We'll read selections from Lahiri's debut collection, *Interpreter of Maladies* (1999), for which she was awarded the 2000 Pulitzer Prize. Born in London and raised in Rhode Island, her novels and essays are also highly regarded. Come to read or just to listen.

Movies in the Chapel: Thanks to all of you who were in the audience for January's film and who made it a record turnout for this event! Let's keep the momentum going with our February showing of "Harriet" (2019) in honor of Black History Month. This is a biographical drama starring Cynthia Erivo as Harriet Tubman. The film chronicles her 1849 escape from slavery in Maryland to Philadelphia, and her subsequent, dangerous missions as a conductor on the Underground Railroad to free dozens of enslaved people. From the Warwick Community School and District

Dear Warwick Community,

At our elementary school, we often talk about being a learning organization—and if you’ve followed our newsletters, you’ve heard us return to that idea many times. To us, being a learning organization means that everyone—students, teachers, and even the principal—is always learning, reflecting, and finding new ways to improve. It’s a mindset that keeps our community strong and focused on our shared purpose: helping every child thrive.

Over the next few weeks, our teachers will be engaging in “collegial visits.” During these visits, teachers will observe one another’s math lessons to exchange ideas, reflect on practice, and serve as thought-partners. This round of visits centers on our work with Building Thinking Classrooms—a framework that encourages students to take intellectual risks, reason through problems collaboratively, and see math as active thinking rather than memorization. It’s inspiring to watch students’ creativity come alive through this approach, and equally inspiring to see teachers learning from one another in such meaningful ways.

We’re also reviewing student writing through our ongoing “all-school write.” Each student responds to the same writing prompt, and teachers look together at anonymized samples to notice growth, identify patterns, and celebrate progress. Using our shared writing rubric helps guide fair and focused feedback across grade levels.

Our spirit of learning extends beyond our own walls. This week, a teacher and our principal visited Hilltown Cooperative Charter Public School to observe their art program and learn more about their arts integration model. In two weeks, their team will visit us to see our art program in action—a wonderful opportunity to exchange ideas and strengthen connections among local schools.

Thank you, as always, for supporting our shared journey of learning and growth. Wishing all of our families a warm and restful winter season ahead.


