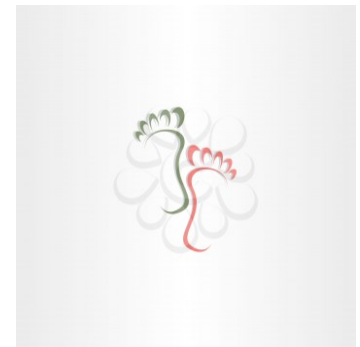

Warwick Historical Society - Voices of the Past

The following is an article from the Enterpriser Orange Journal, September 26, 1924.
It was found by Clara Shepardson when it fell from a book she was reading.

"WARWICK: Flag Raising

Dedication exercises were held at the Teucer Plot last Saturday evening.

This memorial which was created by Charles E. Lemp, in front of the Mt. Grace Inn, is in the memory of the men who died from influenza on board the Teucer during the war. Mr. Lemp, an ex-serviceman was a commissioned officer in the engineering corps and aboard. His Majesty's ship, Teucer, a transport, when the bodies of the five men under his command during the crossing in October 1918, were buried at sea as this ship was nearing the Irish coast. Mr. Lemp has fixed up as memorial to these men a small plot of land between the Town Hall and Mt. Grace Inn with flagpole, rockery, and a row of pines, a water basin and surrounding green. The exercises were as follows: selection by band, America, during which time the flag was raised, by Harrison B. Allen, a Civil War Veteran and George Rost, a Spanish War Veteran. A short address was delivered by Clifford Newton, a World War Veteran. Mrs. Keough, the school nurse, who served as a Red Cross Nurse during the war, scattered flowers and laid wreaths on the lot, after which the memorial was unveiled. This was followed by "Taps" and the lowering of the flag. The exercises closed with the singing of the Star-Spangled Banner, accompanied by the band, and the firing of a salute by canon. The Howitzer Company, 104th infantry of Orange, under Captain R. H. Anderson assisted in the exercises. They also camped on the grounds near the Inn and drills were held on the following day. A dance was held Saturday evening at the Mt. Grace Inn and a concert on Sunday evening.

Charles D. Harris of Amherst, formerly of Warwick, was in town Monday."

Warwick Trails Group April Hike

We invite you to join us for the **Devil's Washbowl Loop Hike**.

When: Third Sunday of the month: **April 19 at 1 p.m.**

Where to meet: Park along the side of the road at the **SECOND** trail sign on Gale Road, about 1 mile from the intersection of Gale Road and Athol Road.

The Hike: This approximately 2.4 mile loop hike has a change in elevation of about \pm 280 feet. We will follow the Washbowl Trail, with several water crossings and a nice spring waterfall midway, and then return on Gale Road to where we parked. For those who want to do a longer hike, we will then hike back-and-forth on the Rum Brook Trail (about 1.2 miles roundtrip). Wear tall waterproof boots, bring hiking poles if you have them, and a water bottle. **We will have maps and a trail description available.**

The all volunteer Warwick Trails Group maintains some of Warwick's town owned trails, hikes and maps existing trails, plans and creates new ones, and occasionally leads hikes around Warwick.

We have seen a great turnout for our Tuesday Senior Meals at Town Hall, served at noon each week. Whether it was the meatloaf or the 41-pound turkey, attendance has been steadily growing, and it has been good to see so many familiar and new faces around the table. We invite everyone to keep coming back. Our goal is to offer meals that are reasonably healthy, interesting, and worth sitting down together for.

Following lunch, our Tech Assistance hours continue across the street at the Old Tavern at the Warwick Inn, open until 6:00 p.m. We also continue to offer Tech Assistance on Thursday mornings from 9:00 a.m. to noon. These sessions support our Digital Equity effort by helping residents make practical use of the fast internet now available in town. Bring a device, a question, or just stop in for conversation. The space is open whether you need help or simply want the company.

As we move into the second half of our year-long Digital Equity initiative, we are looking for more feedback. What would be most helpful to you? One-on-one help, small group sessions, or specific topics like email, passwords, online safety, or using smartphones? Let us know so we can shape the program around what residents actually need.

We are also beginning a community mapping project using GIS tools. Geographic information system is a way of organizing and layering information on a map. The goal is to build a shared, evolving map of Warwick that captures cemeteries, cellar holes, trails, roads, elevation, and other features that define the town. This is something people can contribute to based on their own interests. If you enjoy local history, you might help document old foundations and historic sites. If you are drawn to the outdoors, you might map trails, scenic views, or natural features. If you are interested in geology or land use, you might focus on elevation, soils, or watershed features. There is room for everyone to affect a piece of the map.

The result will be something useful and accessible. It can be printed as a map for use in the field, saved to a phone or tablet for reference while out walking or driving, or used at home to explore and learn more about the town. Residents might use it to locate historic sites, plan a walk or hike, understand the landscape, or simply discover places they have never noticed before. Over time, it becomes both a practical guide and a community-built record of Warwick.

A reminder that Annual Town Meeting will be held on the first Monday in May, with Town Elections taking place two weeks later. We encourage all residents to participate.

We look forward to seeing you on Tuesdays and Thursdays and hearing your ideas as we continue building these programs together.

The Green Corner

The WBEC's Special Investigation Team ventured back into Warwick woods to learn about a worthy project undertaken by Mark Fellows of Chestnut Hill Road. After moving from a busy farming life at Chase Hill Farm in 2017, Mark embarked upon one of his "retirement" projects in 2019 by purchasing a 1985 John Deere 1050 diesel tractor in Bolton, MA, posted on Craig's List. A 4WD with a loader and a large hole in the block. *Perfect!* Mark's goal was to transform it into an electric tractor. Why? "Personal interest, challenge, get away from fossil fuels. I couldn't get my dream tractor anywhere else." This and 40 years of tractor experience would make it happen.

I arrived at the scene early on a very cold morning to find Mark in the barn removing a teal horse blanket neatly bungeed over the tractor's battery, with a large piece of recycled packing material from the Warwick Broadband underneath the horse blanket for extra insulation. The body needed work, and Shawn Noel helped unbend some parts including the hood that was partially caved in. Sean also welded a box out of $\frac{3}{4}$ " steel to hold everything together. It had to be balanced just so, which Mark described as "fun, and it turned out really well." The scoop on the front of the tractor also came through Craig's List, this time in CT.

It took Mark a year to get the John Deere up and running. He searched for a good conversion outfit and eventually found a shop called Green Shed Conversions in Crystal River, Florida. Mark went there and consulted with the friendly and enthusiastic owners who put together a custom kit consisting of a 9" DC electric motor which was wired together and shipped to Mark. The battery consists of used Nissan leaf batteries to create a 72V system. It's a 35-year-old transmission: a 4-speed (H/L with eight forward and two reverse speeds). There are hydraulics to run a three-point hitch and other equipment. He turned the engine on, and I heard a quiet, steady hum. He explained this tractor has lots of power. "It can start in fourth gear - high range without the clutch - and the engine doesn't even care!" Mark emphasized the simplicity of the system.

It's taken time to learn what this tractor can do, most efficiently, at different speeds. Mark smiles and said, "It gives a new meaning to the joy ride for me!" The battery recharges in five to six hours. The tractor has an amperage meter which – with 20 amps remaining – signals it's time to go home. (In the early days, Mark took a load of manure to the Dibbles but was shy of power on the way back, and Clara Shepardson gave him a push back home.) He can bale 100-120 bales at a time in one-and-a-half hours of heavy running or do two to two-and-a-half hours of lighter work. He mows in warm weather and pushes snow all winter. His one wish is that it had a longer run time

Before leaving Mark to work on an issue with the tractor's front axle, I asked him what projects he has in store for 2026? An E-conversion on a 1999 Chevy S10 (already parked behind the John Deere). Also, he hopes to mount between the tractor's rollbar a Prius battery as backup. He's also still searching for the right-sized "EV" red decals to go with the "1050."

For more info and to see this unique piece of equipment, Mark will be at the Garlic & Arts Festival again this summer. Many thanks from the WBEC for your time for this article and for your valuable work.

Warwick Scholarship Committee

The Warwick Scholarship Committee is accepting applications for the scholarship awards for 2026. Students who have been accepted as a full-time student in an accredited post-secondary school and have been a resident of Warwick for 1 year or more are eligible. Students attending Massachusetts Community Colleges are not eligible but can later apply if continuing at a 4-year college.

(Article 11 Eligibility)

- a. The applicant must be a resident of Warwick for one year or more preceding application.
- b. Seniors in the graduating class at Pioneer Valley Regional School, Franklin County Vocational Technical School, other secondary schools and home-schooled students are eligible.
- c. Students in Accredited Post-secondary schools are eligible.
- d. A student is limited to two scholarships awards from the Warwick Community Committee, either from the Warwick Community Scholarship fund or the Alice, Eric, Oscar Anderson Scholarship fund.
- E. The Anita L. Pike Memorial scholarship is awarded to any graduating senior from a public high school with the highest scholastic average and going on to a four-year college.

Application forms and current by-laws are available at the guidance department of Pioneer Valley Regional School or at the Warwick Public Library. Applications must be received prior to April 15th. The application form can be sent to any committee member or sent to Warwick Scholarship, 12 Athol Road, Warwick, MA 01378.

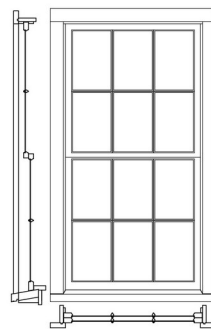
