### ***Warwick Trails Group March Hike***

*We invite you to join us for a hike on the **Darling Brook and Hockanum Hill Trails.***

***When:*** *Third Sunday of the month: March 15 at 1 p.m.*

***Where to meet:*** *At the parking area located on Wendell Road, about 0.7 miles south of the intersection of Wendell and Quarry Roads.*

***The Hike:*** *This long lollipop loop hike (about 5.6 miles) in the south of Warwick combines the ruggedness of the Darling Brook Trail with the more family-friendly Hockanum Hill trails. Please dress for the weather, including hiking or winter boots, and bring a water bottle. We will have maps and a trail description available.*

***Please Note:*** *This hike was originally scheduled for January but was cancelled due to icy conditions. If the Darling Brook Trail is still icy or too snowy in March, then we will park at the Hockanum lot and hike the Hockanum Hill Trails only. Notifications will be posted on the Warwick L and Facebook's L-ternative.*

*The all-volunteer Warwick Trails Group maintains some of Warwick's town-owned trails, hikes and maps existing trails, plans and creates new ones, and occasionally leads hikes around Warwick.*

## WBEC Green Corner

In January of 2025, an outdoor air quality monitor was installed under the fire escape at the Town Hall. If you visit this web site <https://healthyairnetwork.org> and click on "go to map", then find Warwick, you can see the current air quality, and in "history" you can see the readings from the prior seven days. Recently it recorded some moderately unhealthy air quality during a few nights in mid-February.


Many people use wood furnaces, stoves, or fireplaces for heating in the winter months, and smoke from wood burning contributes to higher PM2.5 levels. This can be a particular problem in river or stream valleys, which are prone to temperature inversions that can trap pollutants near the ground. Those of us who live downstream or in colder valleys and pockets are likely to have worse air quality than what the monitor is recording in the town center.

A temperature inversion is when a layer of cold and dense air gets trapped underneath a layer of warmer air (this is opposite from the usual situation in which air near the ground is warmer than higher up). Inversions tend to happen on clear cold nights with calm winds, which allow the ground to cool off quickly. The inversion acts like a lid, trapping moisture (which can cause fog) and pollutants (which worsen the air quality). Sometimes you can tell there is an inversion when you see smoke rising vertically from a chimney and then flowing horizontally when it hits the cold air layer.

During the day, the sun tends to warm up the ground and the air next to it, dispersing the inversion. As a result, air quality in the winter often worsens at night and improves during the day.

Of course there are other sources of air pollution, particularly from vehicular traffic, which is evident when you look at sites near Rt 91 in Springfield.

We can't do much about the physics involved in inversion, but it is helpful to remember that our actions have consequences, even if invisible. Consolidating errands & burning dry hardwood helps us all breathe a little easier.

## Coordinator for March Community Newsletter - David Young

Every now and then I notice that two good ideas can pull in different directions. Lately that has been on my mind with a couple of projects we are working on in Warwick. Both are grant-supported.

One activity is what the paperwork calls "digital equity." I have always just called it learning how to use computers and the internet. The equity part is making it accessible to everybody. We have worked hard as a town to bring fast and affordable internet here. Now the question is simple: How do we help folks make good use of it? Email, photos, paying bills, talking with family, looking things up, all the everyday things people do online. At the same time, we received support to help address elder isolation. That one is plain too. And common. A lot of us live alone. People should not feel stuck at home or cut off from others.

And that is where I find myself scratching my head a bit. Teaching people to do more things online can be useful, but it can also mean staying home more. What we really want is the opposite, or at most a good mix. We want people to see each other, talking, laughing, and spending time together.

So, we are trying to do both at once.

After the Senior Meal on Tuesdays, we keep the space open across the street at the former Tavern at the Warwick Inn. Some folks come by because they need help with a phone, a computer, or an online account. Others come just to sit and talk for a while. That second part may be the most important thing we do.

The space works well for it. Town Hall is busy and shared, but over at the Inn we can leave things set up and keep the door open for a few hours. No rush. No packing everything up the minute we start getting comfortable.

What I would really like is you to make it part of your life. Share your ideas about how it should work. We add another regular meal during the week, maybe something simple brought in from a local restaurant. Maybe people would enjoy cards, board games, or word games. Maybe it is just coffee and conversation. The point is not the activity as much as the company.

If you have been thinking about getting out of the house a bit more, come by and see us. If you have not, please rethink. If you want help with a device, bring it along. And if you have an idea about something we could do together, I would love to hear it. Sometimes the best plans in a small town start with a few people around a table.

The Annual Town Census (Street List) has been sent to residents. Please sign and return the form, even if no changes are necessary. Voters who do not return a census are inactivated and will have to show additional proof of residency at the polls. After some years of census inactivity, voters are removed from the voter list.

Nomination papers are now available for the Annual Town Election. Incumbents do not need to take out papers. Nomination Papers must be obtained from the Town Clerk’s Office before March 28th.

### Am I a Member of the Warwick Women's Guild?

That question was recently asked by a woman of Warwick. The answer is yes. Charles Morse in his history of Warwick, page 248 states "In 1921 the Reverend Crane, pastor of the first Federated Church, conceived the idea of ... an organization of women of Warwick, the purpose ... to promote and encourage any enterprise ... deemed for the best interests of Warwick ... all residents of Warwick were ... members." The Guild has carried out this mission for 104 years. All Warwick women are automatically members of the Guild. There are no dues or other membership requirements.

**What does the Guild do?** Our on-going projects include contributing to the town student scholarship fund; giving flowers, fruit, or baked goods and a visit to residents known to have been hospitalized and now home; giving Holiday fruit baskets to residents age 80 and over (in 2025, 42 residents received baskets); visits to those known to be in need of support; collating, mailing and making available at various locations the Town Newsletter; giving financial aid to residents in temporary need; and always keeping the interests and needs of the town in mind. Each year we try to do a special project. In 2025 we commissioned a local craftsman to repair and/or replace word boards on the Town Welcome Sign.

**When and where do you meet?** The Guild meets the first Tuesday of the month at 1pm in the Town Hall. Any change of date or location would be detailed in the Town Newsletter.

**What do you do at your Meetings?** Meetings are comprised of a program, a reading providing a good laugh or a thoughtful message, a business meeting and, of course, refreshments.

**How does the Guild financially support itself?** We have available for sale coffee and muffins at elections and at Old Home Day, and we have a gift table at the Holiday Fair.

As the Guild meeting time makes active membership of the Guild not possible for some, your support in other ways is valued. We thank you for such support of the projects and fundraising efforts of the Guild. Without your help we could not succeed in our endeavors.

**Warwick Historical Society**

The Warwick Historical Society will have its quarterly meeting at 4 PM on Wednesday, March 18, in the Warwick Town Hall basement. All are welcomed. On hand to review will be papers donated by Ed Witherell, and write-ups about various houses in town by Ralph Witherell and Charles Morse. The Society gratefully accepted these papers and will place them in the upstairs file cabinet for future access in a file labelled "Houses."

Here is an interesting excerpt from Charles Morse's book, *Warwick, Massachusetts: Biography of a Town*, pp. 263-264: "WAWBEEK (Monument) Perhaps the best-known rock rests on the surface of the ground by the roadside, as if left by some gigantic hand millions of years ago. Lying on the West side of Hastings Pond Rd, just a short distance from the village, this granite boulder appears similar to a huge egg lying on its side. Originally about 30 feet high and 20 feet in diameter, a large section of the pointed end was split off by human hands many years ago. Possibly it was intended to be used as a building stone, then the idea was abandoned.

The Athol Young Men's Christian Association had a summer camp for boys in the vicinity of the rock in 1916. Adopting the Indian name for BIG ROCK for their camp, they called it Camp Wawbeek. Fred Berquist, a former granite cutter from Quincy and then a resident of Warwick, cut the name "Wawbeek" in deep letters near the top of the rock. Beneath this name are the words, "In the Beginning God." Thus the rock reminds us of the Creator who made our earth with all its awe-inspiring features." C. Morse.

I might add, it is considered a glacial erratic, deposited by the last receding ice age about 20,000 years ago, composed of gneiss. I also have seen rock climbers use it to practice their moves. Indeed, it is one of Warwick's natural treasures. Take a stroll on Hastings Pond Rd to view it.

**\*NEW\* addition to the Library of Things - "Walkie-talkies":** A pair of perfectly good "like-new" Eodon walkie-talkies was recently found in storage at the Library. They have been tested and are ready for use. A walkie-talkie is a portable, handheld two-way radio that allows for instant, short-range wireless communication, operating on shared radio frequencies by pressing a "push-to-talk" (PTT) button to speak and releasing it to listen, meaning only one person can talk at a time. Battery-powered, batteries included. Instructions also included.

**\*NEW\* Teen Pizza Hangout - Monday, March 2nd, 4-5 pm (Library closed to public):** Here's a chance for local teens to hang out at the Library by themselves—and eat free pizza! The Library closes at 4 pm, so the teens will have the place to themselves, except for the Librarian, who will keep a respectful distance. Irving had filed for bankruptcy in 1818 after a failed family business venture, and wrote the story in one night after being inspired by a nostalgic conversation with his brother. The next morning he presented the first draft to his family over breakfast. Come to read or just to listen.

**Tinware: Everywhere** - from *The Yankee Peddlers of Early America*, J.R. Dolan, 1964:

For a full century and a half—during most of the 18th and 19th centuries—tinware was the number one item carried by the Yankee peddler. Out of it our ancestors were able to fashion a vast number of common, everyday things. Tinware was "virtually unknown" in America when the Pattison brothers, skilled tinsmiths and Irish immigrants, arrived in Berlin, CT in 1738 with their sister Anna, and soon built a shop.

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
