When: *Third Sunday of the month: **June 21 at 1 p.m.***

Where to meet: *Park at Ohlson Field on Winchester Road (Route 78), about 0.5 miles north of the town center or about 2.9 miles south of the New Hampshire border.*

The Hike: *Did you know that Mt. Grace has a little sister? We will visit both on this approximately 3.8 mile up and down hike with a change in elevation of about 990 feet. Starting at Ohlson Field, we will climb Mt Grace first, visit her little sister next, and then return to Ohlson Field. We will be hiking parts of the New England Trail and the Around the Mountain Trail. Bring hiking poles if you have them, bug spray, and a water bottle. **We will have maps and a trail description available.***

Library of Things/NEW! – available to borrow: New: **Projector** - connects to a laptop, cables included. The Library's **infrared camera** can show you where you are losing heat in your home – It's easy to use. The **Watt Meter** will tell you the energy use of household appliances. “Humanism” discussion group - 2nd & 4th Tuesdays, June 9th/23rd @ 7 pm: Discussion facilitated by Jesse Lopes of Warwick, who teaches Philosophy at Boston College. Readings may be suggested but are not required.

Non-Fiction discussion group - Thursday, June 18th @ 7 pm: This discussion group is wide open: Could be something you're reading or listening to: science, history, memoirs, biographies; articles, books, newsletters, journals. It's all up for discussion at the new non-fiction discussion group. Come to share/discuss or just to listen and build your reading list.

Monthly Short Story Hour - Saki, June 25th @ 7:30 pm: We'll read selections from *Saki: Complete and Unabridged* (2006). Saki is the well-known pseudonym used by Hector Hugh Munro (1870-1916), who was born in Burma but move with his family to their native England three years later. His stories, collected in several volumes, are memorable for their depictions of ironic twists of fate and “subtly vicious behaviors that discompose genteel upper class British households.” Come to read or just to listen.

Okay? OK!: This ubiquitous term first appeared in print on March 23, 1839, in the *Boston Morning Post* as a joke abbreviation for "oll korrekt," a playful version of "all correct". This was part of a fad in the late 1830s by American newspapers (particularly in Boston and New York) of intentionally misspelling phrases and using initials, similar to modern internet slang (e.g., "OMG," "LOL"). The term gained massive popularity in 1840 during the reelection campaign of President Martin Van Buren, whose nickname was "Old Kinderhook." Supporters formed "OK Clubs," making the term a campaign slogan: "Vote for OK!" The term then became established as 19th-century slang.



Meetinghouse News

The Meetinghouse Committee wants to keep you updated on the steps being taken to fulfill the task of preserving this historic, iconic building on our Town Common. Some highlights:

A study was completed in 2025 by Spencer Preservation Group outlining costs and priorities for preserving the building which we are reviewing and building upon.

Grant monies have been sought for bringing water to the building in conjunction with Police and Fire Departments for upgrades to their substandard systems. Efforts are being made to test the existing infrastructure so we will be ready for next steps.

A window expert has done a great deal of research into installing storm windows to protect windowsills and has presented options for the doors to ensure they meet egress regulations.

A slate expert and costs associated with regular maintenance of the roof are being sought.

Massachusetts Historic Building designation is being investigated.

An informal open house was held in March to show the beautiful interior of the building, view the structural issues and hear the Pipe Organ play and an event at the 2026 Old Home Days is in the planning stages. If you haven't seen this, check out the Oral History 2023 program available on YouTube:

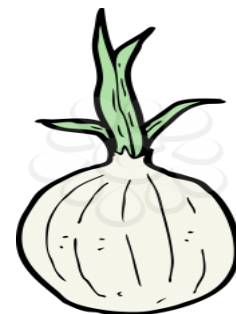

Green Corner: Styrofoam Collection Wrap-Up

Thanks again to all who volunteered in April to be at the Transfer Station to receive Warwick residents bringing styrofoam, and to those of you who brought it to be recycled. Thanks also to Gerry who kept track of the materials from last year and was available to answer brief questions.

We filled half of a 16' MiBox container this year, and along with the other participating towns (Leverett, Northfield, and Montague) a large volume of styrofoam was sent to Gold Circuit E-Cycling in Agawam. The recycling company was pleased with the clean condition of the material, as wet or dirty pieces cannot be repurposed. Thanks to the Town's initiative and Gold Circuit's commitment, we gave a second life to a material that would otherwise have ended up in a landfill.

As we plan on continuing to host this event, *please* save your styrofoam to bring next April. Details will be available next year as to the specific collection dates and other information. This is a worthwhile cause and we truly appreciate your participation.

As awareness of the environmentally toxic nature of styrofoam grows, more companies are offering earth-friendly alternatives. One fascinating example is used by The Farmer's Dog which ships dog food in dissolvable, starch-based "insulation." This biodegradable, plant-based material can be either dissolved in running warm water or composted.

Another alternative is mushroom (mycelium) packaging which is an eco-friendly, durable and moldable alternative to styrofoam. It's made by growing agricultural waste together with the root structure of mushrooms. There are online videos of these and other alternatives which speak to the ingenuity of people who care about our world.

MOORE'S POND BEACH COMMITTEE UPDATE

Spring has arrived at the beach to find that it survived the winter very well. We had our Annual Beach Clean-up on Saturday, May 23. Also, the monthly testing of the water began, so the beach opened Memorial Day weekend. Many thanks to Patty Bellemare for managing the many aspects of monthly water testing for the last few years. We appreciate Theresa Edwards for taking over this role, as it is vital to making the beach available to the town.

A sanitation survey of the pond conducted by a registered sanitarian is required every ten years by the Commonwealth of Massachusetts to operate a beach. This process is underway.

The committee is considering adding a hole to the picnic tables for visitors to be able to add an umbrella to the tables for shade while they visit.

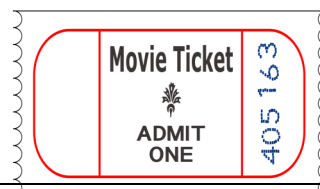

STRPB Regionalization
More Educational Opportunities For Each Tax Dollar Spent**

This article primarily focuses on the benefits of regionalization for its secondary students (grades 7-12) which the town is equally responsible for in addition to its elementary students. Our municipal Prek-12 school district tuitions its secondary students to Pioneer Valley and Ralph Mahar regional school districts: Warwick has no voting members on either. Franklin County's PreK-12 enrollment has declined by about 4,000 students over 20 years. Schools struggle to support programs without a critical mass of students. This led to a structural deficit: Students get less while the taxpayers pay more! This trend and financial pressures prompted the formation of the STRPB to address the sustainability and affordability of towns. After five years of research, they concluded the benefits for students, staff, and our communities would be significant.

Elementary Schools (class instruction): All elementary schools remain open; Warwick must educate these students in our rural small town; More teachers within the district sharing successful teaching practices and programs; More professional development opportunities and collaboration would be available for teachers of similar grades.

Middle and High Schools (subject area instructions): Stronger long-term programming sustainability; Access to specialized staff; Expanded student engagement; More teachers in subject area yields more teaching approaches to learning; More robust performing arts.

Staff: Combined talented staff to share best learning practices; More certified teachers in content area; Unified support staff to address emotional and social needs of students; Offer existing and new courses and return some of the eliminated extra-curricular activities.

Financial Benefits for Warwick: Costs spread over a larger taxbase; More predictability in assessments; Unanticipated expenses for specialized services shared among towns; Provides for greater administrative efficiencies; More value for the tax dollar.

Warwick's Commitment to Reopen the School: Several years ago, it took a determined community effort to reopen our school. It provides quality programs and its success is attracting both School Choice from surrounding towns and tuition students from Winchester, NH. Warwick can continue this commitment in a six-town regional school district, making it more affordable for the town to support, in addition to offering other services. The Planning Board's proposed regional agreement sets a very high bar for any elementary school to be closed. The previous Regional Agreement had no such language and our representatives on the Planning Board helped develop this safeguard language.
